Swimmers urged to clear path for migrating salmon

The Fish and Wildlife staff is asking swimmers to think about migrating salmon when they build recreational dams for swimming. Protecting salmon is particularly important this year because run predictions are less than optimistic.

Salmon migrations are currently underway in Shitike, Mill, Badger and Beaver creeks, and the Warm Springs River. The fish are en route to spawning grounds, where they will produce future runs of Chinook salmon.

As the fish move upstream they are sometimes confronted with rock barriers built by local swimmers who are trying to es-

cape the summer heat. Unfortunately, the barriers that create excellent swimming holes for humans can also become insurmountable barriers to salmon.

To avoid potential problems for salmon, the Fish and Wildlife staff recommends leaving a minimum two-foot gap in recreational dams so fish can pass without difficulty. Gaps should be placed in deep water portions of the main channel, giving salmon the right-of-way to their spawning grounds.

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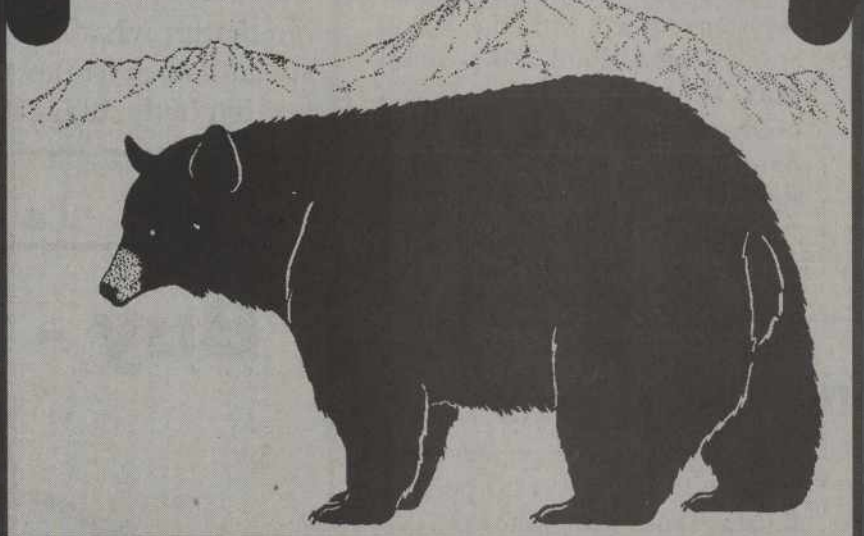
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
