Study looks at fire fuel reduction

A warm, crackling fire is appealing during winter – but right now, flames are exactly what researchers are trying to keep away from the forest for the summer.

Dr. Chad Bolding, a recent PhD graduate from Oregon State University, presented his findings from a project aimed at reducing fuel for forest fires to the Department of Natural Resources June 20.

His team used two methods – mulching and masticating – to reduce the amount of fuel that a forest fire could potentially consume.

According to John Arena, a silviculturist with the Branch of Forestry, "The fuels are all the small trees out there."

Researchers are trying to

duce the number of small trees to make the area suitable for low-surface fires that burn along the ground, rather than a potential zone for catastrophic fires.

The project shows the effects of mechanically cutting these trees out, as compared to trying to burn them out, Arena said.

Years ago, fires used to serve a purpose in the forest. "Fire was normal," Arena said. "Every 11 years fires would come through this kind of ground."

The fires would burn below the forest canopy, allowing larger trees to survive. Now, Arena said, a fire would simply burn everything, including the larger trees.

The goal is for forests to be treated so that in the future,

fires can be run through the forest once again as it did historically.

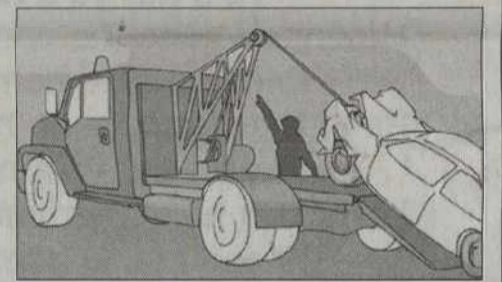
According to Arena, fires put nutrients into the soil as well as allow fresh bitter brush to grow – something that's essential in the survival of deer. Right now, Arena said, "It's not nutritious for the deer as much, it's all woody fiber."

Smaller trees aren't going to waste, however, as researchers are trying to develop a plan that allows Warm Springs Forest Product Industries to use the wood chips to produce steam used for cogeneration.

Arena said that through the project they found approximately 50,000 acres of Ponderosa pine forest that could be treated.
