

## Irrigation for community garden

The Warm Springs community garden will have irrigation water, and will be much larger next growing season.

Utility Department workers recently installed the irrigation line to the garden, located in the field by the administration building. The water will allow the garden to be larger in size next year.

The garden, called the Tenino Garden, has been a volunteer-driven project, with support from a grant through the Office of Rural Health, and supported by the Community Health Improvement Partnership of Mountain View Hospital.

This year the volunteers planted corn, to-

matoes, peppers, cantaloupe, carrots, lettuce, pumpkins, beans, pea pods, and strawberries. Children from the Boys and Girls Club planted flowers.

The first community garden began in 1999, but ended three years later when grant money ran out.

Departments working together to create the garden include the Community Health Improvement Partnership, the Diabetes Prevention Program, Utilities, the Community Health Education Team, Community Counseling, the Boys and Girls Club, KWSO, and the OSU extension office.
