

## Program promotes home buying

The Warm Springs Tribal Credit Enterprise and the Warm Springs Housing Department are sponsoring a seven-week homebuyer class for tribal members.

The first session will meet at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, March 4. Sessions will be from 6 to 7:30 p.m.

The mission of the class

is to help tribal members learn how to buy a home that fits their needs and budget and enjoy the journey. There will occasionally be goodies and singing. You may call 553-3201 to register. Class size is limited to 30. A waiting list will be kept for another session if necessary.

The curriculum will include items such as: how to determine

if home ownership is for you; how to analyze your credit and repair it if necessary; how to select a property, negotiate the purchase, apply for a loan, and how to maintain the property after it is yours.

Instructors will be from Warm Springs and the surrounding area.

From 1:24-2:40 p.m. also on Saturday is a presentation on ospreys, "Getting to Know the Fish-Hawk." And from 1-2:15 p.m. on Saturday: "Dead Things and the Clean-Up Crew," a presentation on vultures.

The Saturday presentations on eagles will be from 1-2:15 p.m. (bald eagles); 1:25-2:40 p.m. (golden eagles); and 1:50-3:05 p.m. (bald eagles de-listed).

The day starts at 9 a.m. at Overlook Park with greeting and partner recognition, status of the bald eagle in Oregon, and

golden eagle status.

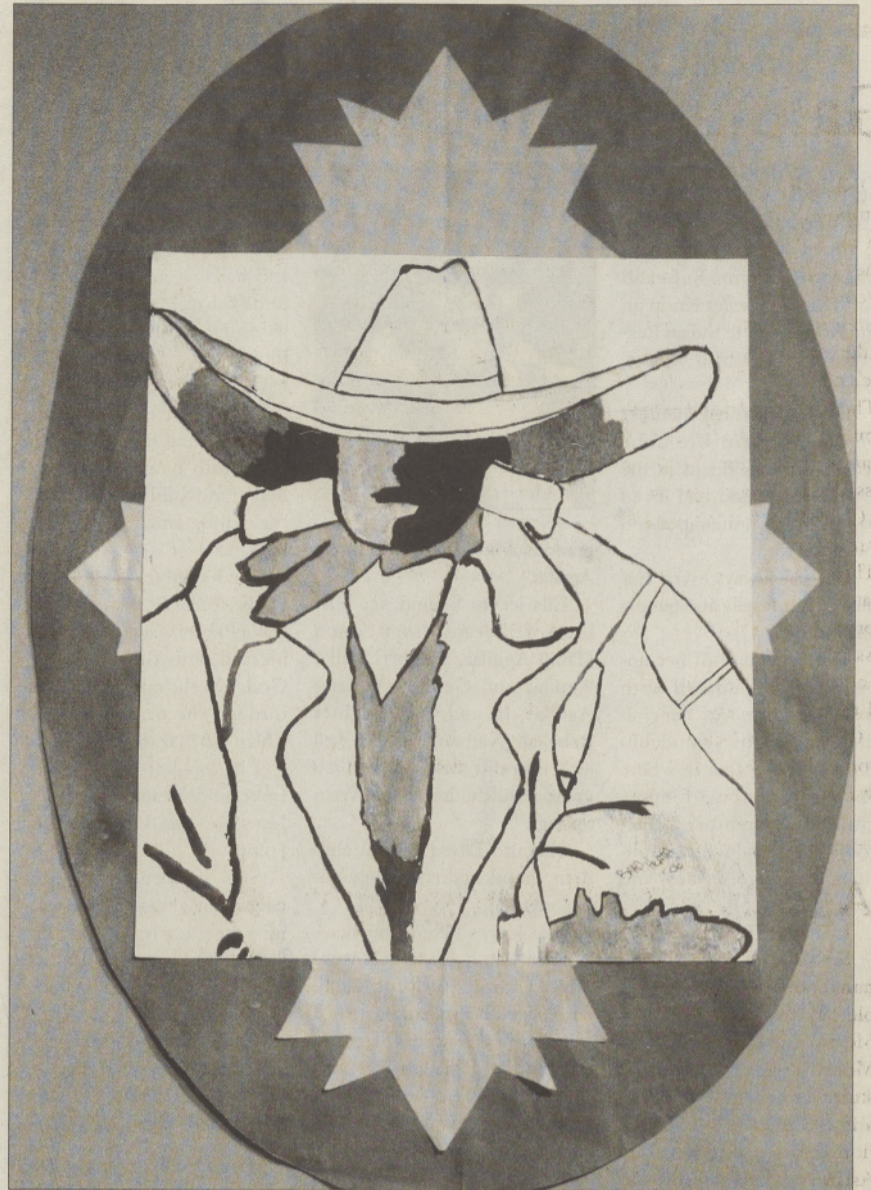
Live birds of prey will be on hand during the day. Lunch will be served at noon.

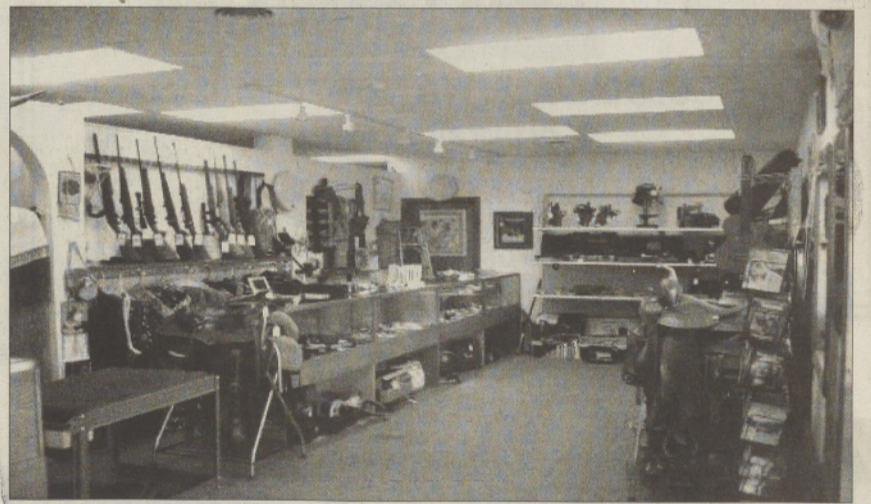
