

Kah-Nee-Ta offers student scholarships

Kah-Nee-Ta High Desert Resort and Casino is accepting applications for the 2008 male and female scholarship awards.

This opportunity is for Warm Springs tribal members choosing to further their education at an accredited four-year college as a full time or part time student or enrolled in an accredited two-year college or vocational/technical school.

Applications will be available at the Warm Springs Education Building and Kah-Nee-Ta's Human Resources Office and must be received by the deadline of July 18 at 5 p.m.

Of those applicants meeting the deadline and completing their applications, the following will be awarded:

Accredited four-year college: One female recipient will be selected to receive \$1,000 and a laptop computer (valued up to \$500).

One female recipient will be

selected to receive \$500.

One male recipient will be selected to receive \$1,000 and a laptop computer (valued up to \$500).

One male recipient will be selected to receive \$500.

Accredited two-year college, vocational or technical:

One female recipient will be selected to receive \$500.

One male recipient will be selected to receive \$500.

Application must include the following items:

Official high school or secondary learning transcript or a copy of GED.

Acceptance letter to school; one letter of recommendation from a supervisor, teacher or clergy.

One personal letter of recommendation; personal statement limited to one page listing activities and accomplishments to date, and goal and reasons for seeking higher education.

Councilwoman attends Democratic platform convention

Tribal Councilwoman Aurolyn Stwyer recently met with Chelsea Clinton, who was in Oregon at the Democratic platform convention in Eugene.

About 300 people were in attendance. "She was amazingly articulate," Stwyer said of Chelsea Clinton, 28.

Clinton fielded questions from the audience, including question from Stwyer regarding energy production, hydroelectric dams and their devastating impact on the survival of salmon.

Clinton discussed economic development in general and the Cheney-Bush Energy Bill, which Sen. Hillary Clinton has opposed as unfairly favoring oil companies.

Councilwoman Stwyer has been a Democratic grass-roots

activist for many years, working with tribal member Alyssa Macy, who is a national leader for the Native American, "Get out and VOTE" campaign.

Stwyer said she supports Sen. Barack Obama for the Democratic nomination for president of the Oregon. She is in the Steering Committee with the Oregon Tribal Network for Obama.

But Stwyer said she greatly enjoyed meeting with Chelsea Clinton, who also visited Oregon State and Portland State universities while in Oregon.

Recent visits to Oregon by Chelsea, and her parents are aimed at overcoming the lead that Obama has shown in polls. Obama also campaigned in Oregon and is expected to return, as are the Clintons.

The Oregon primary is May 20. Ballots are expected to be mailed out during the first week of May.

Stwyer has submitted her name to serve as a delegate at the Democratic National Convention.

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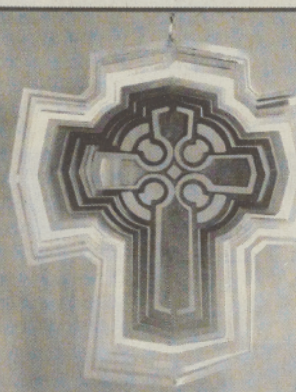
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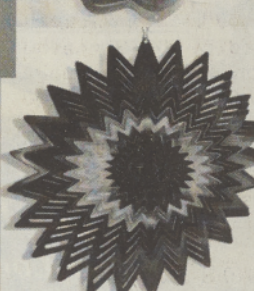
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
