## Team releases timber sale assessment

The Resource Management Interdisciplinary Team has released a draft project assessment covering the Old Mill 2009/Camp Trail Timber Sale for public review.

The document was prepared by the Project Interdisciplinary Team to provide options for timber harvest in Mill Creek watershed.

Three alternatives were formulated and numerous logging methods were considered for this project, taking into account present resource conditions, for

est health and public input. The Old Mill 2009/Camp Trail Timber Sale is expected to yield approximately 24 million board feet of timber.

The document is divided into sections explaining the purpose and need for action, resource-based indicators used to help the technical staff analyze and mitigate environmental impacts, and details of the three alternatives.

There are maps showing the harvest blocks, quick reference tables to compare the alternatives, a list of measures needed

to mitigate environmental consequences, and the Project Interdisciplinary Team's recommended alternative.

The goal of Alternative A is to continue current management. Activities such as hunting, recreation and cultural food gathering would continue as in the past.

The only harvest proposed under Alternative A would be through conventional salvage operations. Alternatives B and C are designed to harvest 24-25 million board feet of timber

from approximately 2,000 to 4,000 acres.

The three alternatives would have varying impacts on water, fish, wildlife, cultural, timber, range, soil and economic resources and there would also be some changes to the transportation system.

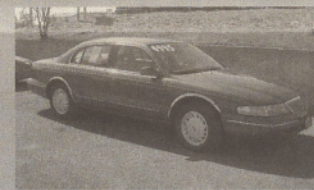
