"At first that made me mad," she said, "because I wanted them all back. And I felt like CPS wasn't working with me."

But in time she began working with CPS instead of against the program.

"And I saw what they meant and why they were doing this— It was because I had always gone back to drinking and using drugs. When I accepted what they were doing, I was all right about it."

Yet there were times during the two years when the situation seemed impossible.

"I would get emotional and think I couldn't get through, then the CPS worker would help me through it," she said. "And I prayed a lot about anything and everything."

With help from CPS and other programs, Kalama began looking for a job.

For a while she worked as a volunteer. Then through a grant she got a job at the Department of Human Services. She now works part-time at the Family Resource Center, and part-time at the DHS office in Madras.

Last month she regained custody of her youngest child, and

the family is together now for the first time in two years. And Kalama has been clean and sober for two years.

"I can look back now and be appreciative of CPS," she says.

For anyone struggling, she says, "There is help out there. You have to seek it out. What made the difference for me was the desire to have a better life."
