Resource team approves creek, other projects

The Resource Management Inter-disciplinary Team recently approved a project assessment for restoration work on Shitike Creek near the community area.

The team also approved a number of smaller projects.

The Shitike Creek restoration project will reduce impacts caused by erosion near the community waste water ponds, reduce the risk of future flooding, and improve fish habitat.

The streambed that has been channelized downstream of the Wellness Center will be relocated to the north, where it will assume a more winding and natural course.

The realigned creek will

feature a number of meander bends and appropriate side channels.

The bends will be stabilized by placing engineered log jams in the creek. The project will affect 2,800 feet of Shitike Creek.

Phase 2 of the project will include removal of the decommissioned wastewater settling ponds. The sludge and clay liner underlying the sludge will be removed and disposed of appropriately.

The resource team also approved small project assessments for the Pinky Beymer Conservation Plan, the Cortazar home site phone line trenching, and the Weylon Beymer home construction.
