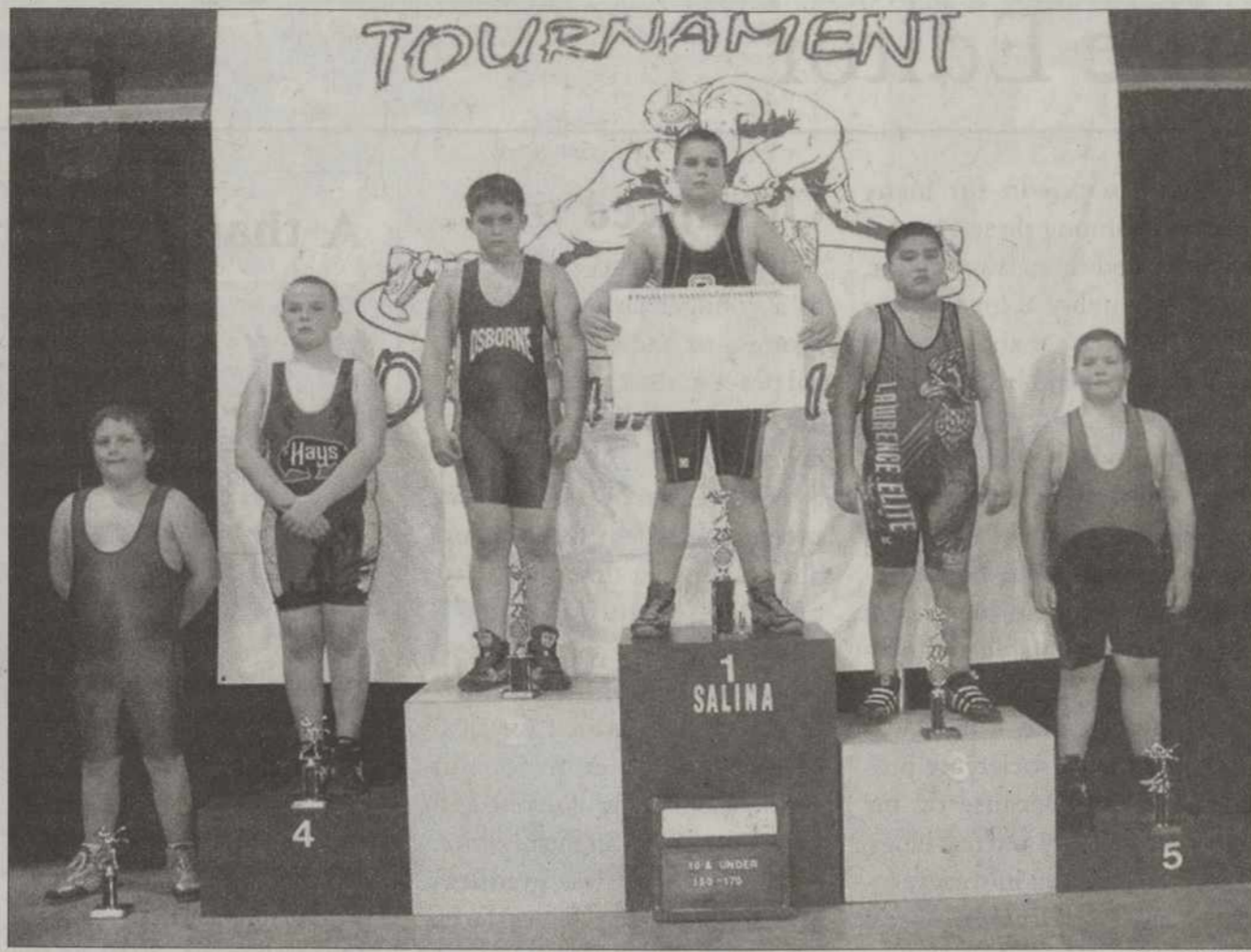
Quentin was then placed in consolation side of the bracket. From there, he won all of his matches.

Quentin remembers when, in his words, his dad dumped him off at wrestling practice one day. "And I liked it! After that I just wanted to do it."

"I think kids need to look for a sport that fits their needs," he said. "Because of sports, I stay out of trouble. The tournament was my one-year mark when I started wrestling, so I still have a lot to learn."
