

Tribal fishing permits now for sale

Warm Springs Reservation fishing permits are now for sale at selected vendors. Permits can also be purchased on-line at: tribalpermit.com

The Confederated Tribes require anglers to have a fishing permit for selected waters bordering and within the reservation. Open areas are:

The Metolius arm of Lake Billy Chinook, Lake Simtustus, the Deschutes River from Dry Creek to the Warm Springs River, and in several high lakes.

Fishing opened for bull trout in the Metolius arm on March 1. This population is very healthy and should provide an exciting season.

Permits are available for the season (\$35), three days (\$23) and one day (\$12) at the following vendors:

Fire camp crew training this spring

Fire Management will soon conduct its fire camp crew training course.

Fire Management for the past several years has provided the training, and fielded camp crews that have helped fight fires around the Northwest.

To qualify to work at a camp crew, a person must complete the eight-hour course, offered at Fire Management. The courses are tentatively set for late April to early May.

There is a limit of 25 participants per class. The seats

are filled on first-come first-serve basis. This is a paid training class. A person showing up late, or showing signs of intoxication, will be excluded. Must be 18 or over. No drivers license required.

Anyone who completes the class will be registered as qualified for camp crew duty during fire season.

Fire Management expects to have four to seven crews, plus a crew each with WEDD and Forestry, for up to nine total. Each crew has ten people.

"We're looking to employ as many tribal members as possible," said William Wilson, assistant Fire Management officer, logistics.

The total number employed will depend on the severity of the fire season, Wilson said. Also, he added, there are a number of other camp crews being organized in the Northwest, so competition for the work this year is high.

To attend the Fire Management training course this spring, a person will need photo identification and a Social Security number. These are required in order for the participant to be paid for the class.

Another requirement this year is a one-mile walk prior to the training. The walk will be conducted the morning before the class begins.

Wilson said he hopes to meet with camp crew supervisors the week before the classes begin.

Fire management developing emergency crew

From Warm Springs Fire Management

The Fire Management Department is developing an emergency 20-person fire crew for the 2012 season.

The purpose for this crew is to supplement the local firefighting crews at Warm Springs Agency in the event of fires occurring here locally. Large-fire occurrence has been more prevalent in the last 10 years and the near future outlook remains at a high potential for re-occurrence.

Our local fire season usually begins in July and runs through September. If we get enough eligible individuals interested in participating in this program, we will be offering the basic fire training for any individual 18 years old and up to be available for the 2012 fire season.

There are National Requirements that each individual will be required to meet before they are certified to go out on the fire line.

Fire crew requirements are as follows:

Pass the arduous three-mile walk with a 45-pound pack under 45 minutes. (The participant must pass this test before they can take the basic fire courses.)

Pass S-130, S-190, I-100, L-180 courses.

Attend the full week of training without missing any part of the courses being presented in order to receive credit for all required courses.

Pass drug test.

Stay physically fit throughout the fire season.

Have a reliable pair of vibram sole boots before reporting for fire duty.

We are planning on present-

ing the classroom portion of this process during the month of May. We will get the announcement out to the public once we establish the agenda.

Individuals who are interested in participating in this program are encouraged to start some type of physical fitness program before taking the three-mile pack test. Each individual will only get to do the pack test two times in one fire season.

We will be doing the pack test through the month of April; dates to be printed in the month of March editions of the Spilyay.
