



Mont. tribes receiving settlement money

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Some Indian tribes have started receiving their shares of a \$1 billion settlement with the U.S. government over mismanagement of their money and trust lands, while others are waiting and remain undecided on what to do with their windfall.

The agreement between the government and 44 tribes across the nation was announced in March to settle claims of money lost in mismanaged accounts and royalties from natural resource development.

The tribes sued in an attempt to receive an accounting of the Interior Department's management

of the trust funds and to learn how much had been lost.

Their claims dealt with tribal trust funds and not individual trust funds, which is addressed in the \$3.4 billion class-action settlement led by Elouise Cobell, the Blackfeet woman who died last year.

Blackfeet chairman T.J. Show said that tribal leaders will soon distribute \$9 million of the \$19 million his tribe is due to receive. That's about \$550 per person, which Show said will help residents on a reservation where the unemployment rate is between 70 and 80 percent.

"I believe it will be an economic benefit to the tribal members to use as they see

fit, whether it be for college kids going to school or parents just needing to feed their child," Show said.

The other \$10 million has been earmarked for investment in projects such as a 90-room hotel to be built on the reservation, Show said. The Great Falls Tribune first reported the Blackfeet tribe's plans to disburse the settlement money.

Others, such as the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes, said they have not yet received their settlement money. CSKT spokesman Rob McDonald said tribal leaders have not decided what to do with the \$150 million when it comes.

The tribal council is taking suggestions in meetings that run through July 9, but does not know when a decision will be made.

"There is definitely no shortage of rumors flying around, but if anyone claims to know what the council will do, they are simply being hopeful or making it up," McDonald said.

So far, the ideas have run the gamut, from paying it all out to tribal members to allocating it to elders and language programs. One suggestion was to require people under the age of 25 to take a course in money management.

Hopis approve water rights settlement

KYKOTSMOVI, Ariz. (AP) — Hopi lawmakers have approved a settlement that recognizes the tribe's water rights in the Little Colorado River basin.

Thursday's vote marks a distinction between the settlement and legislation introduced in Congress to approve the settlement.

Tribal Chairman Le Roy Shingoitewa (sing-OY'-tee-wah) says the settlement would end decades of litigation and bring a dependable, clean water supply to Hopi communi-

ties. He says he would ask Sen. Jon Kyl to remove provisions for a power plant and other items from the federal legislation.

Navajo lawmakers also must approve the settlement for it to move forward. They're set to vote on it next week.

The settlement recognizes the tribes' rights to groundwater and surface water within the basin and funds groundwater delivery projects. In exchange, the tribes would waive further claims in the basin.

Tribal elders aim to connect with modern kids

RIVERTON, Wyo. (AP) — About 25 people, mostly children, gathered silently in the teepee's cool, shaded interior as Eugene Ridgely Jr. talked about owls representing an ominous sign.

"An owl is a bad omen with some Arapaho families,"

Ridgely said, seated in a chair opposite the teepee's waist-high entrance while his listeners sat on the grassy ground and stared back.

"How many have heard that an owl brings bad luck?" Ridgely asked, getting about a dozen hands in the air.

The belief is not commonly shared among Northern Arapaho people, he said, noting that "owl medicine" is known by some to heal and help.

"So it's either way with owls," he said. "This is the stuff I was taught when I was

growing up. I still practice that today."

The many tribal beliefs he told at a recent Northern Arapaho Women, Infants and Children agency Healthy Families Conference allowed participants to learn about owl medicine and other information to help their lives.

"Mainly I'm looking at the healing aspect, the healing component of it," said Blanche Friday, the agency's outreach coordinator, several feet from the three teepees erected for the event at St. Stephen's Indian Mission.

"There is intergenerational trauma for a lot of the families out here. When a community comes together, they heal. They don't have to have those other negative behaviors, the drinking, that kind of stuff," Friday said.
