The Global One agency is based in Los Angeles but has offices in South Korea, and in Texas. They have alliances with the Asian entertainment market.

Demetria is the only Native American on the agency roster. By her looks she could also take roles as an Asian or Latina girl, if the circum-

The move to Los Angeles will be a big change for Demetria and the family, as they have lived in Warm Springs all their lives. "I am going to miss my friends and family I have here," she said.
