

Big win for White Buffalos at N. Marion

The Madras White Buffalo varsity football team looked like an entirely different team last Friday against North Marion. The game got off to an unusual start when the Huskies decided to onside kick the initial kickoff.

The move surprised many, including Madras head coach Rick Wells, who said, "It's high school football, you've got to expect those kinds of things... We had our breaks," he added, "and they had theirs."

The attempt to trick the White Buffs was short lived and North Marion would give up possession after just 7 plays.

Two plays later White Buff wide receiver Devin Ceciliani

ran for 80 yards for the first of six Madras touchdowns. Later, Ciciliani would score on a run of 25 yards and a pass of 7 yards.

The White Buff defense, which has struggled against the run in three previous games, was much improved.

In the first half, each time North Marion would gain possession, the Madras defense stepped it up a notch, only allowing small gains.

Coach Wells said, "We just told ourselves that we were going to have the mentality to get better."

The Huskies' best drive lasted 15 plays that chewed eight minutes from the clock, but was stopped after Nick Picard exploded through the line and sacked the North Marion QB for an 11 yard loss.

Three plays later the hus-

kies were forced to punt and the White Buffs responded with a three play drive that concluded with an 85 yard touchdown strike to wide receiver Jack Fine.

Madras would get one more score before the half when QB Steele Haugen connected with Aaron Phillips on a 56-yard pass to the corner of the end zone.

In the second half North Marion fumbled the kick off and the White Buffs went seven plays, ending in a 4-yard touchdown run by returning back Joe Hisatake.

The Huskies would end up scoring three touchdowns in the second half but it wasn't meant to be, as Madras kept the ball on the ground and would eventually take a knee to finish the game with a 46-18 Tri Valley League win..

Madras QB Steele Haugen

completed 12 of 16 passes for 238 yards and three touchdowns.

Devin Ciciliani scored three times, Joe Hisatake twice, and once each for Jack Fine and Aaron Phillips.

The White Buffaloes (2-3) will now prepare for their next game this Friday against Molalla. The Indians come into the game with a 1-5 record and 0-1 in league games. Last week Molalla was beaten by Estacada 6-0.

Madras coach Wells said of Molalla, "We know each other very well. We run similar offenses and similar defenses, and it will be a slugfest. They want to make the playoffs just like we do."

Friday's game can be heard on KWSO 91.9 FM with Will "The Wilman" Robbins calling the action starting at 7 p.m.

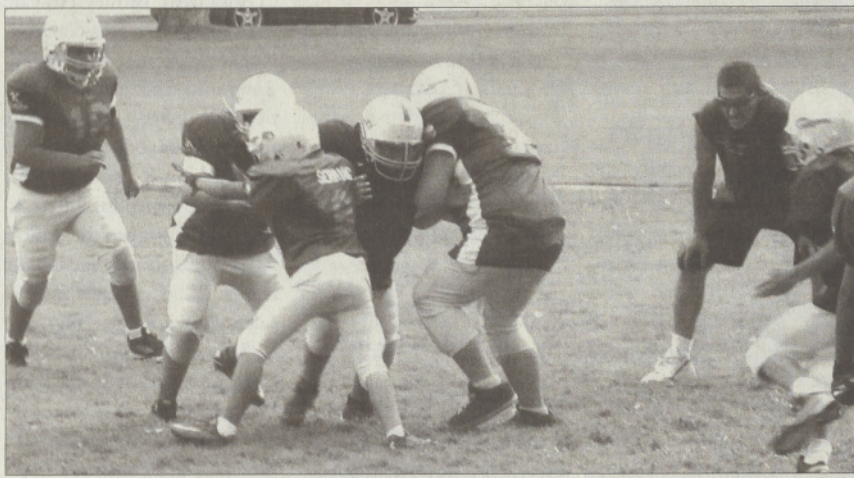

Important to report poachers

The reservation is just over 650,000 acres covering over 1,000 square miles. So it is not always possible for law and game enforcement officers to spot every poacher who might be hunting or fishing on the reservation.

Tribal members who wit-

ness a fishing or wildlife offense are being reminded that they have the ability to report offenses.

The tribes need your help in protecting natural resources. If you witness a violation, please call 541-553-8300. Those who report may remain anonymous.

Ceded Area buck tags

Ceded Area buck tags are available for hunting through Oct. 31.

Reservation buck tags are available for hunting through Oct. 28.

Bear season is from now until Nov. 30, 2012; and again from April 13-May 31, 2013.

Cougar season is through March 30, 2013.

Tags will be given out two days prior. Natural Resources has extended hours for Thursday and Friday, 8 a.m.-7 p.m.

Hunting season update from Wildlife Dept.

Please come by the Natural Resources office to pick up your ceded and reservation tags and a state lands Big Game Regulations Guide and to sign up for lottery hunts.

You may pick up your tag up to two days before the start of the hunt.

The following are the 2012 Warm Springs Reservation Hunting Regulations:

Deer season: Sept. 29-Oct. 28. Bag limit is one buck deer having not less than a forked antler, per family.

Elk season: Nov. 3-18. Bag limit is one elk per family.

Nov. 19-30. Bag limit is one antlered elk per family.

Bear season: Fall: Sept. 29-Nov. 30. Spring: April 13-May 31, 2013. Bag limit is one bear per month, except cubs and sows with cubs are protected.

Cougar season: Sept. 29, 2012-March 30, 2013. Bag limit is one cougar per month

per family. It is unlawful to take spotted kittens or female cougars with spotted kittens.

The following is a list of ceded land tags that are available. (For a list of hunts starting in November, December and January visit the Natural Resources office.)

Buck deer-Bag limit is two buck deer with visible antler per person (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).
WSDT - Ceded Area Buck 1 - Sept. 29-Oct. 18.

Hunts starting in October:

Antelope-Bag limit is one doe or fawn (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).

WS443A1 - Columbia Plateau No. 1 - October 13-21.

Antelope-Bag limit is one buck (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).

WS443A2 - Columbia Plateau No. 2 - Oct. 13-21.

Antlerless elk-bag limit is one antlerless elk (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).

WS247D2 - W Grant Pvt #2 - Oct. 1-Dec. 31.

WS237T2 - Ochoco Unit Youth Hunt #2 - Oct. 13-19.

WS240A - Maupin-West

Biggs - Oct. 13-Nov. 30.

Buck deer-Bag limit is one buck deer with visible antler per person (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).

WSDT - Ceded Area Buck 2 - Oct. 19-31.

Buck deer-Bag limit is one deer either sex (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).

WS100M - Hood Unit & Hood Rvr Valley Muzzleloader - Oct. 13-23.

WS139M1 - SE Metolius #1 Muzzleloader - Oct. 20-26.

Bull elk-Bag limit is one bull elk with visible antler (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).

WSCET - Cascade General Elk Season - Oct. 13-19.

WSRME1 - Rocky Mtn. No. 1 Elk Season - Oct. 24-28.

WS235M - Paulina-E. Fort Rock Muzzleloader - Oct. 13-21.

Controlled elk-Bag limit is one elk either sex (hunt number, hunt name, hunt dates).

WS265M - E Grant Muzzleloader - Oct. 13-19.

WS238C1 - Grizzly Private No. 1 - Oct. 24-28.

WS241A - The Dalles

Watershed - Oct. 24-28.

WS247A1 - Northside Pvt No.1 - Oct. 24-28.

WS248A2 - Heppner No. 2 - Oct. 24-28.

WS248B1 - Ritter No.1 - Oct. 24-28.

Controlled elk-Bag limit is one spike only.

WS249A2 - Ukiah Unit No 2 - Oct. 24-28.

Mandatory reporting
For 2012 there is man-

datory reporting of hunter harvest.

Failure to report harvest results will be a loss of hunting privileges for the subsequent tags.

Hunters are important sources of wildlife related information. The information gathered from hunter surveys is valuable for biologists, wildlife committee and tribal council to help make informed wildlife management decisions.

By reporting, you are helping monitor wildlife populations and helping enhance hunting opportunities. Information from hunters who did not hunt or harvest an animal is as important as hunters who did take an animal. Hunter surveys are available at the Natural Resources office and will be given out with tags. Thank you for your participation!
