

## Electrical short sparks cash machine fire

Indian Head Casino was closed to the public for several hours last Thursday, Oct. 18.

An ATM-type machine, designed to dispense cash and cash winning tickets, caught fire in a back office. This happened shortly before 6 a.m.

Damage from the fire was contained to the machine itself, as smoke from the fire activated the overhead sprinkler system.

Fire Chief Dan Martinez said the sprinklers poured about 900 to 1,200 gallons of water into the office where the machine was located.

The water then traveled out the door, down a hallway

and into other offices. Most of the damage was from the water. A team of professional cleaners were called in to restore the carpeting.

No part of the gaming area of the casino was impacted by the fire, smoke or water.

The public was asked to leave the casino, though, as a precaution.

The casino was closed for about 10 hours, starting at 5:45 a.m., reopening later that afternoon. Security guards were at the entrance to the parking lot, informing the public that the building was temporarily closed.

Damage was estimated at around \$175,000.
