

Cardinals upset Bears in tournament

Shoni Schimmel scored 22 points in the Louisville Cardinal's upset victory over the Baylor Bears in the women's NCAA tournament.

Baylor, the defending champion, was the top-rated team in the tournament, and many believed they would again win the NCAA championship.

The Cardinal's 82-81 victory on Sunday was one of the biggest upsets in tournament history. The Cardinals are a five-seed in the tournament.

Schimmel is from the Pendleton area, and has family and friends among the Warm Springs membership. Her sister Jude is also a cardinal. With her 22 points against Baylor, Schimmel also had three steals, two assists and one rebound.

In the win against Baylor, the Cardinals limited 6-8 Brittney Griner of the Bears to just 10 field-goal attempts.

Baylor had only lost one game this season. Last year they went 40-0, and brought back all their starters.

Louisville went 16 for 25 from 3-point range, tying the NCAA tournament mark for 3s, and making the most ever in the regional semifinals or beyond. Schimmel had five 3s.

You may pick up your tag up to two days before the start of the hunt. The following are the spring 2013 Warm Springs Reservation Hunting Regulations:

Bear season

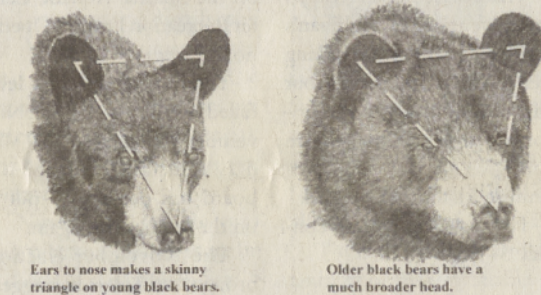
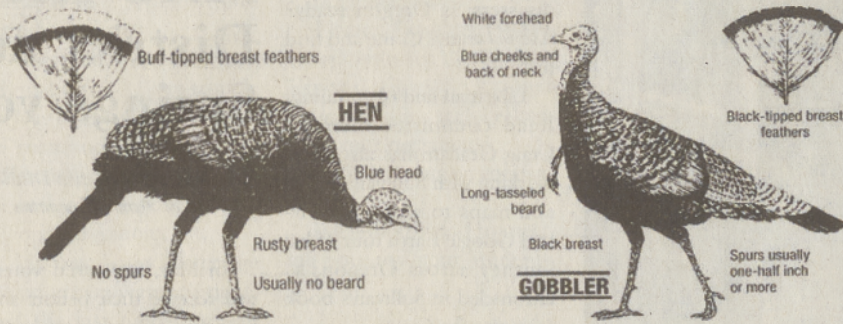
April 13-May 31: Bag limit is one bear per month per family, except cubs and sows with cubs are protected.

Want to know how old your bear is? To have harvested bears checked please bring bear skull and carcass (if possible) to the Natural Resources office.

Turkey season

April 13-May 31: Bag limit is one Tom per month.

Know before you go: The difference between tom and hen turkeys.



Please participate in hunter surveys. Hunters are important sources of wildlife related information. The information gathered

from hunter surveys is valuable for biologists, wildlife committee and Tribal Council to help make informed wildlife management decisions.

By reporting, you are helping monitor wildlife populations and helping enhance hunting opportunities.

Information from hunters who did not hunt or harvest an animal is as important as hunters who did take an animal. Hunter surveys are available at the Natural Resources office and will be given out with tags. Natural Resources staff thanks you for your participation! The office is located at 4223 Holliday Street. Native Flute players, violin and piano students will be featured.

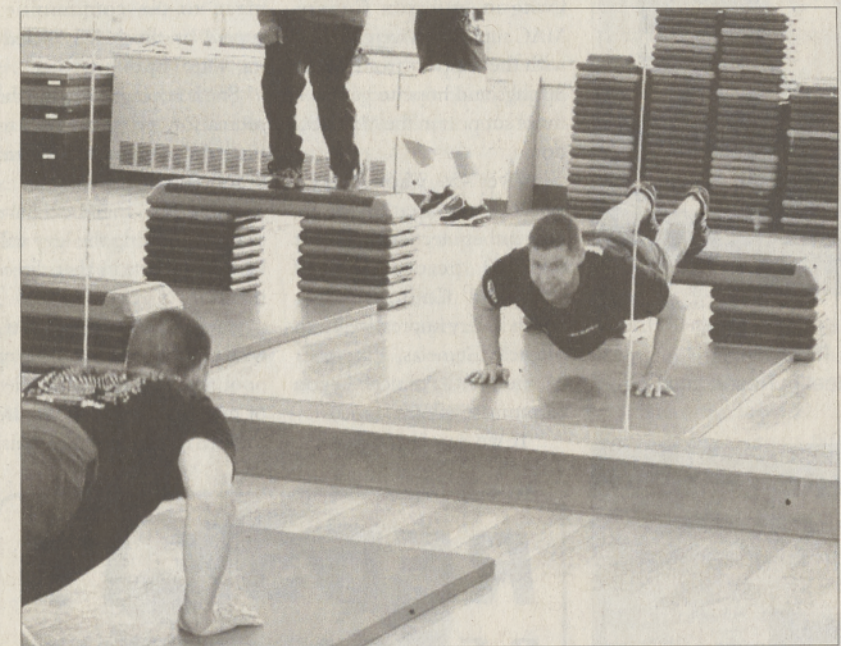
Everyone is invited to come and hear what our kids have accomplished this year in music.
