Congress of American Indians marks 70th year

TULSA, Okla. (AP) - The 70th annual National Congress of American Indians opened in Tulsa with tribal ceremonies.

Gov. Mary Fallin welcomed up to 3,000 attendees from tribes across the coun-

try on Monday.

Fallin congratulated tribes on their work to improve tribal health care, tying tribal efforts to national reforms.

Fallin also addressed the government shutdown, urging lawmakers to "see the light

and get their act together."

With 38 federally-recognized tribes in Oklahoma, Fallin says she hopes Oklahoma can continue to be a leader among tribes in the U.S.
