Oregon Senate votes down legal aid bill

The Oregon Senate voted 15-15 to defeat a bill that would have provided added funding for legal aid organizations in the state.

"It would have helped our lower-income tribal members, and all on limited income," said tribal Government Affairs Director Louie

Pitt. The 14 Senate Republicans were joined by Scappoose Democrat Betsy Johnson to defeat HB 4143. The vote in the House earlier this year, moving the bill to the Senate, was also along party lines.

The funding for legal aid would have come from un-

claimed settlement money from class action lawsuits.

Currently, the unclaimed money is returned to the defendant corporation. In opposition were large corporations that are, or could be defendants in class-action cases.

Session 4: Post-Exposure Prophylaxis with Dr. Liss, 2:45-4 p.m.

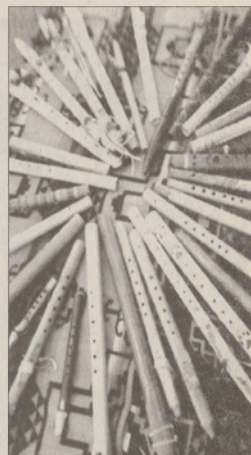
Gathering of Flutes this spring

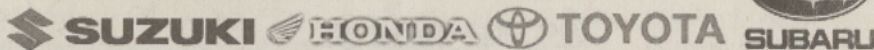
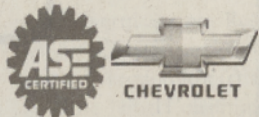
