# STAND training for tribes, youth workers

The Center for Healthy Communities is coordinating with the Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board to recruit Pacific Northwest tribes and tribal organizations who serve American Indian high-school aged youth to receive training on the delivery of Native STAND—Students Together Against Negative Decisions.

STAND is a healthy decisions curriculum for enhancing and promoting positive development and well-being.

The Native STAND training program will take place June 21-27 in Portland, in conjunction with the Summer Research Training Institute for American Indian health professionals, and the THRIVE—Tribal Health – Reaching out Involves Every-

one—tribal youth Conference.
