

Remembering when...

25 years ago – From the May 4, 1990 Spilyay Tymoo:

The Confederated Tribes purchased the Duke Morrison property, and two smaller parcels on the Metolius Arm of Lake Billy Chinook. Total price was \$558,000.

20 years ago – From the April 28, 1995 Spilyay:

The Confederated Tribes set May 1 of this year as the official opening date of the temporary Indian Head Casino.

The temporary facility is located on the second floor of the Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge, in the former Wasco and Paiute rooms. There will be 137 video slot machines in the temporary facility. In other news:

In light of reduced projections for the 1995 spring Chinook run, members of the Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission voted to suspend all tribal subsistence and ceremonial fishing.

The closure was an-

nounced after the U.S. vs. Oregon Technical Advisory Committee downgraded the spring Chinook run size from 12,000 to 9,800 fish for the season.

15 years ago – From the May 4, 2000 Spilyay:

A new gaming facility at Madras represents the best possible answer for the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, as the tribe faces projected revenue shortfalls in 2003 and beyond, tribal leaders say.

Tribal Council set May 23 for a vote of the people on a proposal to expand the tribes' gaming program by developing a new casino on tribal trust land in the industrial area just north of Madras. Elsewhere:

10 years ago – From the April 28, 2005 Spilyay:

The Confederated Tribes and the state of Oregon completed a gaming compact for a casino at Cascade Locks. Meanwhile, the name *Bridge of the Gods* was chosen as the winner of the Casino Name Contest.
