Another option was to extend the administrative leave for two weeks, while General Managers and department directors develop plans for a partial re-opening of the organization. This could in-volve a requirement to wear medical masks at work, have sufficient hand-sanitizer and disinfectants, and ensure social distancing.

This option could also involve developing lists of employees who

could be at added risk from the virus, such as those of a certain age, or with an underlying condition. At some point these employees could be required to take fur-lough until the pandemic is under control.

Council is planning to meet again as soon as next week to continue discussion of the immediate future of the organization and employees.
