Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training—Asist—provides practical training for those seek-

ing to prevent the immediate risk of suicide. The training workshop is open to anyone 16 or older.

To sign up contact Rosanna Jackson with Lines for Life, one of the sponsors with the Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board. Limited space for the June workshop in Warm Springs is 30 people maximum. Participants will

learn:

How to recognize people at risk of suicide. Talk, hear their story and understand their situations. Assess the risks for suicide, and reach out and offer support. Help them stay safe with life affirming intervention.

Continuing Education Units are available; must attend both days to get the CEUs.

Come early enough to visit the tribal vendor stands where you can support the community by purchasing gifts of beadwork, photography, and original art.

The concert begins at 6 p.m., featuring as special guest artist the award-winning Native American flutist, James Edmund Greeley.

A gentle reminder: Respect the sacredness of the site by refraining from picking up or removing any objects, including plant life.

The walk from the parking area to the concert site is about 250 yards on rough gravel. Once at the concert site, the terrain is very uneven and rocky, unsuitable for wheeled mobility devices, challenging for those with mobility issues.
