It is hereby ordered that the defendant is excluded from the Warm Springs Reservation permanently. Compliance with this exclusion order may be enforced by the contempt power of the Tribal Court.

Council chairman responds to federal apology regarding boarding school legacy

The federal executive branch recently issued a formal apology for the atrocities committed against Indigenous children during the 150-year era of forced federal Indian boarding schools.

Tribal Council Chairman Jonathan Smith Sr. made the following statement in regard to the apology: “For generations, our people have carried the weight and suffering from this historical injustice carried out against us by the federal government and religious institutions.

“These boarding schools sanctioned unspeakable emotional, physical and cultural harm against us, forcing us to carry this pain in silence.

“We appreciate the President’s historic and long-overdue acknowledgement of these harms and the government’s formal apology. This is an important first step in our collective healing.

“But the true measure of these words will be in the actions that come from them. We look forward to working together on concrete commitments that demonstrate a genuine redress of this deliberate pain.”

Mr. Vasquez is studying finance at Yakima Valley College.

He lived for a time in Phoenix and “traveling the U.S. and Canada, I’ve noticed a proclivity for poverty, trauma and abuse in Indigenous communities,” he said in a comment on Facebook. “I’d like to shed some light on it.”

He’s planning to do more runs in the future.

“Yakama to Muckleshoot is my next destination,” Vasquez said. “My magnum opus is going to be running from Washington state to Arizona.”

An announcement on social media about the run was shared more than 400 times as of earlier this weekend. Among the dozens of comments, people praised him, asked about his fueling strategies and how they could support him financially or otherwise. Vasquez was invited to stop at Celilo Village, at the site of Celilo Falls, where he received some dried fish.

Warm Springs residents also greeted Vasquez at the end of the run. He said he didn’t expect such a big of a response, nor did he set out to make himself a celebrity, he said. He sincerely appreciates the support from so many.

About two months ago, Vasquez ran from Union Gap to Mabton, about 32 miles from one side of the Yakama Reservation to another, he said. That went well, and he’s been wanting to run from a Yakama boundary to a Warm Springs boundary for a while. “I’ve been wanting to do this run and now I have time,” he said.
