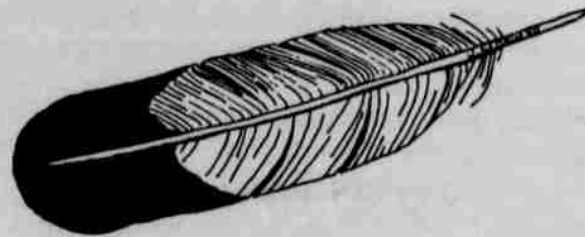

Mother Earth's Children

Mother Earth's Children presents the Ann C. Thornton Memorial Fund Scholarship. Four (4) \$500 awards will be selected by Mother Earth's Children for American Indian/Alaska Native students who live in Oregon and who are enrolled (or will be enrolled) in a college or university in the Fall. Criteria for selection will include: the student's grade point average (GPA), financial need, extracurricular activities in school and the community, and motivation.

Deadline for submission of the scholarship application is May 1st. Notification of awards will take place during the month of May. Funds awarded will be sent directly to the student over the academic year in three payments, pending the satisfactory academic standing of the student during each school term. Funds not awarded will be reintroduced into the scholarship fund for future awards.

Students who apply for this scholarship need include the following:

- 1) a completed application form printed ink or typewritten.
- 2) a school transcript (either official or unofficial).
- 3) a copy of an ED Form 506 or Johnson O'Malley form or other evidence of American Indian/Alaska Native heritage.
- 4) a short letter from a school counselor or teacher describing your attendance, special interests and participation in school activities.
- 5) a short letter from an American Indian/Alaska Native about your participation in activities related to your heritage.
- 6) a letter, not to exceed 300 words, telling the committee about yourself.
