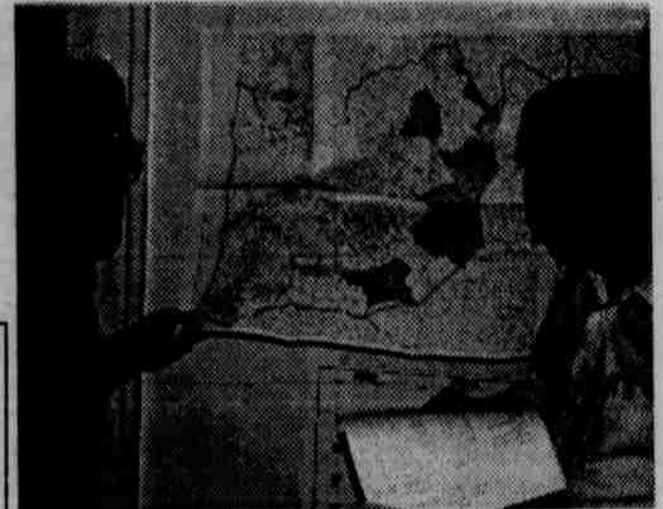


Fish and Wildlife^(Cont.)

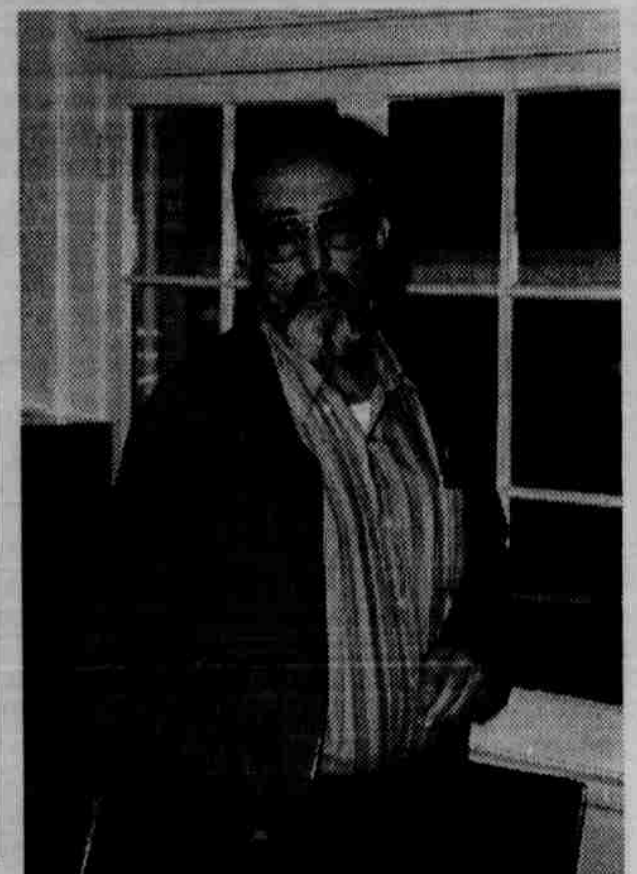

VIDEO REVIEW: "The Way of a Trout"

If you are looking for an informational trout video for children and adults alike, then this Trout Unlimited offering is just what you're after. "The Way of a Trout" is written and narrated by Frederick O. Hutchinson who assumes the role of "The Angler" throughout the video.

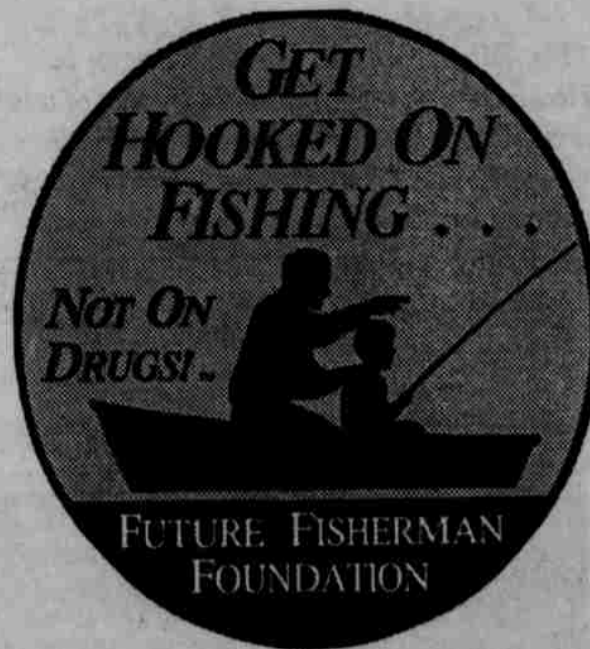
Hutchinson takes the viewers on one of his fishing adventures and along the way educates you on the entire freshwater trout spawning and growth process by way of some sharp, sophisticated photography. Hutchinson's video, which was produced and directed by James W. Wilkie and photographed and edited by the respected Fred J. Roleff, follows a rainbow trout's life from spawning to adulthood from a unique "fish-eye" view.

Hutchinson and Roleff detail the mating process and the beginnings of life. They explain the trout's intense instinct for survival and educate the viewers on the various life-threatening situations that all young trout inevitably find themselves in. Threats like water scorpions, adult trouts, king fisher's, ducks, otters, green herons and finally man are all illustrated. Roleff's photography is at its best when a trout's life or death struggle with an otter is captured on film.

This Disney-like video is perfect for educating children about all aspects of the fresh water trout species and just entertaining enough to keep an adult's attention.

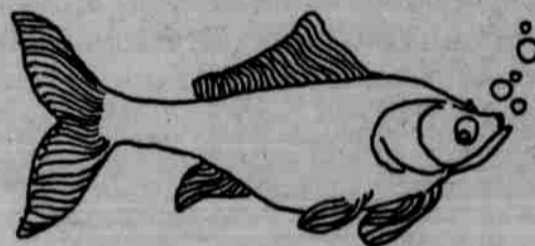


National Fishing Week is June 4th - 10th
