knowledge of education assessment tools; education services and community resources; developmental tasks and stages of young people from ages 10-18; American Indian/Native American culture and beliefs.

ABILITY TO: Communicate effectively both verbally and in writing; direct or lead working teams; deal effectively with young people from ages 10-18; maintain records and files; establish and maintain effective working relationships with schools, community services, state, tribal, local agencies and other employees; successfully participate as part of an interdisciplinary team in evaluation and treatment planning; work independently; develop and review curriculum/assignments covering a wide variety of subject areas.
