The Tribal Education Trust Fund Scholarship Program is designed to recognize and provide financial support to Tribal members who have demonstrated scholastic and leadership abilities and wish to continue their Education. The Scholarship program is open to ALL Tribal members, regardless of residence, age or need.

Eligibility Requirements: provide verification of Tribal enrollment; submit a complete application by **April 30**.

Priority fields of study for the Tribal Scholarships are: Law, Education, Health, Natural Resources and Business. The Eula Petite Memorial Scholarship is for Education and Teaching degree only (student must be at the Junior level).

Scholarships are renewable so long as the student meets minimum academic and attendance requirements and remains within established time frame for completion.
