

Tribal Library's Great Movies Review "Anger Management" and "Pure Luck"

When Comedian David Spade did his "Hollywood Minute" on Saturday Night Live, he had a bit where he talked about movies that were like other movies. "Casino," he said at one point, "Ca-seen-it when it was called, 'Goodfellas'."

For the comedy, "Anger Management," starring Adam Sandler and Jack Nicholson, you might want to say, "It was even a good movie when it was called, 'Pure Luck,' starring Danny Glover and Martin Short."

Both feature relatively normal, decent guys getting paired up with nutcases. In "Anger Management," Sandler is his usual decent self, if a little slow on the self-assertive side, and through a series of airplane mishaps, ends up in court and assigned to anger management counselor Nicholson.

As cute and decent and straightforward as Sandler can be, that's just how devilish and deceitful his counterpart is. Fighting Nicholson all the way, Sandler finally hits a home run in the wild conclusion on the field in Yankee Stadium.

Great cameos by John C. Reilly, Woody Harrelson and former New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani.

In "Pure Luck," hard-baked but reasonable detective Glover gets called in to find the lost daughter of an insurance magnate (Sam Wanamaker). The daughter is a little luck-challenged, however, bumping into doors, falling off of balconies, and while she comes out of her accidents in fine shape, those around her are not always so lucky.

When she is missing for a month, Wanamaker's wily assistant comes up with the idea of pairing Glover with Martin Short, an accountant in the firm whose approach to luck puts him in league with the exec's daughter. To turn the screw one more time, the assistant insists that Short be told that he is actually in charge of the investigation.

With beautiful Mexico as a backdrop, Short bumbles his way ever closer to the lost daughter with Glover fighting him and assorted mobsters all the way.

A case of amnesia and two people on a piece of dock floating toward a giant waterfall make the show all the more memorable to the audience, though they don't seem to affect the characters any. ■

DECREE CHANGING
NAME

Based on the allegations set forth in the petition for change of name filed by the Petitioner in the above entitled case and its supporting affidavit, and the testimony of Petitioner.

THE COURT FINDS:

1. The Petitioner is over 18 years of age;
2. The Petitioner is an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde Community of Oregon;
3. The Petitioner has not petitioned and been granted a change of name by the Tribal Court with in the past twelve (12) months;
4. All persons entitled to notice have been properly served with a copy of the Notice for Name Change, and;
5. No objection to the petition has been filed by any creditor or former spouse of the Petitioner.

Based on the foregoing findings,

THE COURT DECREES:

1. That the name of the Petitioner be changed from Amber Rae Huettl to Amber Rae George;
2. That the Clerk of the Tribal Court shall cause a copy of this order to be published in the Tribal Newsletter;
3. That the Clerk of the Tribal Court shall submit a certified copy of this order to the Tribal Enrollment office;
4. That the Petitioner shall surrender all old Tribal Identification cards bearing Petitioner's former name to the Tribal Enrollment office prior to the Enrollment office issuing Petitioner new Tribal Identification cards bearing the Petitioner's new name;
5. That within sixty (60) days from the date of this order the Tribal Enrollment staff and if necessary the Tribal Enrollment Committee shall cause new Tribal Identification cards to be issued to Petitioner showing the new name of the Tribal member and shall change the official membership roll and all official enrollment records of the Tribe to reflect the Petitioner's new name as stated in this Decree;
6. The Clerk of the Court shall provide a certified copy of the Order to the Washington State Department of Vital Statistics.

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GRAND RONDE VETERANS' ROYALTY

All interested girls and boys must be able to meet the following guidelines in order to be eligible for the Veterans' Royalty Court:

- All must be enrolled members of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde.
- Participants should have never been married and have no children.
- All must be enrolled in and currently attending a public or private school.
- All must be drug and alcohol free.
- Must have one year of pow-wow experience.
- Must have their own regalia, or be able to make their own regalia before the application deadline. Participants must be willing and able to attend all Veterans' events and be prepared to represent the Veterans and the Tribe.
- Must have a parent or sponsor willing to participate and attend activities with the girls and boys and provide transportation.
- Royalty Court participants and their parent or sponsor must attend all required events (pow-wows, parades, fund-raisers, organizational meetings and others). Absences can be prearranged with the Royalty Committee Advisor. Three unexcused absences will result in disqualification from Royalty Court. Please note that all participants receive 1 point for every event for the contest. Royalty Court participants are expected to stay for the duration of the events. This includes helping set up for events such as meetings and parades, as well as dancing during Grand Entry, Intertribals and staying until the flags are retired unless pre-approved with the Royalty Advisor. Participants are expected to speak in front of large groups of people. Royalty Court participants must be willing and able to dance. Remember: You are all part of a team and are expected to treat yourselves, running mates and others with respect at all times.

■ As of July 9, 2007 you must be 10 to 14 years of age for Junior Veterans' Royalty Queen/Junior Veterans' Young Warriors; and 15 to 18 years of age for Senior Veterans' Royalty Queen/Senior Veterans' Young Warriors.

Deadline is June 15, 2007.
