The A. Susana Santos' Journeys in Creativity • August 9-22, 2009: Traditions in Metal
In fourteen amazing art-packed days, twelve teens will embark on a journey together through the remarkable world of Native American art and culture. Their guides on the expedition will work side-by-side with them in intensive, hands-on art workshops, share cross-cultural experiences with them, and take with them to local museums and galleries. This creative cultural exploration will take place on the beautiful campus of Oregon College of Art and Craft in Portland, Oregon.

History: The Journeys in Creativity program was founded in partnership with OCAC, the Museum of World Cultures, and the National Museum of the American Indian. K-5 Summer Program

There will be a limited number of openings for the K-5 Summer Program. The program will run from Monday, June 8, to Friday, Aug. 14, 2009.

The K-5 Summer Program is open to all K-5 Native American youth, with preference given to Tribal and/or "Special/High-Needs" youth.

For families who qualify, a sliding fee scale is available and enrolled Tribal youth may use the CTGR Youth Sponsorship.

Ted R. Lilley Cancer CURE Program

Summer Internship for High School Students

The Ted R. Lilley Cancer CURE Program is a summer internship in research mentorship training at the Knight Cancer Institute at Oregon Health Sciences University. It is designed to offer research experiences to students from socially and economically disadvantaged populations from the Portland metropolitan area. The long-term goals of this program are to give hands-on research experience and science exposure to disadvantaged students in biomedical research and other health-related programs.

Program participants will participate in defined projects and will be expected to create two formal reports — one with their mentor's work, and one based on their own research. Work deemed competitive will be submitted to national and regional student research programs. In addition to participation in daily activities in their preceptor's laboratory, trainees will meet weekly during the summer for a series of seminars that address a wide range of scientific and ethical issues in various areas of biomedical research. Participants are compensated \$10 per hour for eight 40-hour work weeks in addition to public transit passes for the eight-week period.
