Willamette hosts 'Vital Signs' exhibit

Hallie Ford Museum at Willamette University in Salem will host "Joe Feddersen: Vital Signs" beginning Saturday, Jan. 30.

This major retrospective includes workshops with the artist, weekly gallery talks and a teachers' workshop.

The installation is the end of a regional tour drawn from public and private collections throughout the United States, including the Hallie Ford Museum of Art, the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art and the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian.

The exhibition explores Feddersen's interest in the interrelationships between urban place markers and indigenous landscapes through combinations of contemporary media and Native iconography. It features a selection of his later work in prints, weaving and glass. The exhibition includes more than 60 works created since 1996.

The exhibition runs through March 28.
