The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife has set the season for harvesting lamprey at Willamette Falls for June 1 through July 31. Harvesting may be conducted 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday through Monday. Harvesting is not allowed Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday.

Harvesting is confined to the east side of Willamette Falls and does not include the horseshoe area at the peak of the falls. Gear is restricted to hand or hand-powered tools only.

A permit is required, but Tribal members are allowed to use their Tribal enrollment card in lieu of a state-issued permit. Catches must be recorded on a Fish and Wildlife Department harvest card available from the Grand Ronde Natural Resources Department or by contacting the Clackamas ODFW office, 17330 S.E. Evelyn St., Clackamas, OR 97015.
