Yamhill County starts new Veterans Recognition Program

MCMINNVILLE — It saves to be a veteran in Yamhill County.

County Clerk Brian Van Bergen has teamed up with the county's Veterans' Services Office and local businesses to offer discounts and free upgrades to veterans.

The program was launched on Tuesday, April 7.

Yamhill County veterans will no longer have to carry around copies of their discharge papers to prove they are an honorably discharged veteran to receive benefits. When an honorably discharged veteran records their discharge papers with Van Bergen's office, they will be offered an official and free photo identification card.

Veterans can then visit the Yamhill County Veterans' Services website to see a list of merchants who will accept the ID card for discounts, free upgrades or other benefits.

Yamhill County merchants who want to offer a veterans' discount should visit www.co.yamhill.or.us/clerk and fill out a business application on the home page.

"We believe there are many people throughout the region who will show their appreciation to veterans in a tangible way, especially if they have an easily recognizable way to confirm that a veteran is who they say they are," Van Bergen said in a press release announcing the start of the program. "All we've been lacking up until now is the connection between veterans and those who want to recognize them for their service."

"Proud participant" merchants also will receive a poster to display at their business announcing that they are involved in the program.
