## PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE OPEN FOR COMMENT

The Tribal Council is considering adopting amendments to the Personnel Management Ordinance. The proposed amendments were given a First Reading at the Aug.12, 2015, Tribal Council meeting.

The proposed amendments (1) modify the random drug testing requirements (all other testing remains the same) under the Tribe's drug free workplace policy to include only safety sensitive positions; and (2) make other technical corrections including updates to the list of recognized Tribal holidays and Council direct reports. The proposed amendments may also include minor technical (i.e., typographical, housekeeping) modifications.



## **Tribe receives Native language grant**

The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde received a three-year grant from the Administration for Children and Families to aid Native American language revitalization efforts. Planning and Grants Manager Kim Rogers said the grant will fund half-day Chinuk Wawa immersion, building up to K-3 over a three-year span. It also will fund master-apprentice training, curriculum development and translation, and outreach to new parents for early language learning. The first-year award is for \$262,385, the second-year award is for \$283,197 and the final year award is for \$290,879. The Tribe currently has 17 enrolled students in the Chinuk Wawa Language Immersion program and the goal is to provide half-day K-3 immersion to 24 students by the third year.

The Tribe also plans to provide Chinuk Wawa lessons to 10 parents of infants in the first year and grow to at least 14 by the third year. ■

## **Sunshine harvest**

NRG Energy has leased land along Highway 18, a knoll just above the four-lane stretch between Sheridan and Willamina, and is having Enerparc, a company based in Germany with offices in the United States, construct a 3 megawatt solar farm. There will be 9,456 solar panels and the electricity generated will be sold to Portland General Electric. NRG Energy is a leader of the green energy initiative, including wind power, solar thermal energy and photovoltaic.

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
