

Grand Ronde Eclipse



Grand Ronde's total eclipse will start at 10:17 a.m. Monday, Aug. 21



Notice the temperature dropping?
Record the temperature 15 minutes or so before totality and 15 minutes afterward. The results could surprise you.



Protect your eyes.

Cardboard eclipse glasses are equipped with mylar lenses allowing you to safely look directly at the sun ANYTIME. The cost of a pair of eclipse glasses could be as low as \$2 a pair. Do not look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun through an unfiltered camera, telescope, binoculars or other optical device.



On Aug. 21, 2017, the moon will pass in front of the sun and its shadow will sweep across the contiguous U.S., crossing about 14 states from Oregon to South Carolina



The area could get more visitors.

Potentially 250,000 to 500,000 people could travel to the region to view the Aug. 21 eclipse.



Faster than an F-18 fighter jet.

The eclipse shadow will be traveling at 1,150 -2,400 miles per hour. Those along the path of totality will get but just a short window of totality before the eclipse races on toward its next destination. Grand Ronde will get 1 minute 41 seconds of totality, according to NASA's eclipse app.



Cellphone Outage.

You may experience degraded cell signal due to the number of people in the area during the eclipse.
