Rewards Offered

1) \$5,000 is being offered for any information that leads to solving Heather Cameron's missing person case. Cameron went missing on Aug. 18, 2012, from a remote area of Shasta County, Calif. She was last seen with her ex-boyfriend, Daniel Lusby, and they were heading to Keswick Dam, a remote area 20 minutes outside of Redding, Calif. She called 911 three times from Lusby's cell phone near the Keswick Dam area and she has not be heard from since.

2) \$1,000 is being offered in any information leading to a resolution of this case: On March 17 at an unknown time, a small 18-gun Sentry gun case was stolen from the 900 block of Southwest Pine in Willamina. The gun case had seven rifles and two handguns, as well as other personal items inside. Guns that were inside the case were a Browning bolt action A-bolt.270 with 3x9 Nikon scope; blued with wood stock Browning BAR semi-auto .243 with 3x9 Nikon scope; blued with wood stock Browning semi-auto .22; blued with wood stock Henry Golden Boy lever action .22; blued with wood stock and gold accents with bluing Remington bolt action .22; blued with wood stock. Magazine is missing from a Howa bolt action 22-250, blued with black synthetic stock and scope — scope manufacturer is unknown; Savage bolt action 25-06, blued with black synthetic stock; open sights pistol blued revolver .380 in black sheath, possibly five shots only; and unknown manufacturer Thompson Contender handgun with .223 barrel installed, blued with wooden stock, rear sight is loose and missing a screw.

Eligibility:
GTGR welcomes information from all sources in resolving pasted crimes. That said, suspects, conspirators and persons who have provided non-reliable or conflicting information will not be eligible for a reward. Further, those individuals who have a duty to perform law enforcement or prosecution activities as well as their immediate family members are not eligible to receive rewards, unless unique circumstances exist that would otherwise qualify them for reward receipt outside their normal duties. Further, those who provide information but wish to remain anonymous will not be eligible for a reward as GTGRD will only pay rewards to named individuals.

Payment of Rewards:
Rewards will only be paid to a named individual who verifies he or she was the one who provided the information. The reward will be paid by the GTGRD by check. It is the sole responsibility of the person receiving the reward to pay any required taxes on the reward and GTGRD recommends the recipient of a reward consult with a tax professional with respect to tax liability.
