BILLS PASSED BY OREGON LEGISLATURE.

SALEM, Feb. 28.—(Oregonian)—The bill to add a half acre to the State of Oregon's land in the State of Washington, with its boundaries defined, has been introduced in the Senate.

To require state railroads to provide ventilation of winter coaches in great cars.

To prohibit lumbering in the Coquille River valley.

To provide for a new school building in the town of Coquille.

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
