EDITORIAL.

Andrew Carnegie's compound of evil and good deeds reflects the brilliancy of the satanic mind which engages to possess both the world and Heaven.

Carnegie's colossal robberies, and the lessons of power learned from the purchasing price of money seem to have brought him to conclude that he can buy off the King of Heaven, and for that purpose he is giving large sums of his "blood" money for charitable purposes.

Where can equity abound? When will the blood of the victim cease crying from the ground for redress?

From England, just now, come horrible tales of child murder for gain, the child's life having been first insured for a few paltry farthings, often less than thirty dollars, is then sacrificed by inhuman parents to obtain the insurance.

This is one of the varieties of the fruit of a system of business founded upon greed and competition. A fountain cannot produce water superior to its head, and neither can a business system which is founded upon greed, develop the highest character of the human race and lead mankind to a realization of peace and general prosperity.

It is argued in defense of the present system that competition is necessary in order to develop the highest degree of individuality, and that anything looking toward a more equitable arrangement would tend toward effacing this quality of a man's character.

This so-called individuality is very much marked in some men, also in some animals. J. Gould cultivated this peculiar mark of individualism sufficiently well so that he accumulated many millions of dollars, but as the means he used to attain his purposes were unjust, his memory is no more highly respected today than the animal he patterned after—the dog.

The individuality of the operators of Wall street and their classmate out most brilliantly when our nation was disrupted with internal strife. It was then they took advantage of the government's need of money and supplies with which to buy and feed the men necessary to put down the rebellion, and the government was made to stand and deliver in every possible manner in which those sharks could conceive, and strange to say, each mark of individualism along that line was that of selfishness.

There are other classes of men in which each member has shown marked individuality of a high degree, and with these men it was not the love of money which lured them on toward the lights they attained, but the delight they derived from the knowledge they secured in accomplishing the achievement. This class of men under the competitive system use their knowledge to acquire a competency that will insure them against want, but mostly the share which falls to the man who has wrought out some great truth is but a mere pittance when compared to the share of the party who purchases his thoughts or invention.

Individuality, so-called, is diverse. Napoleon Bonaparte represented one peculiar type of it, but as he represented extreme selfishness to the extent of great ability to contend for it, the world was made little better for his having lived in it outside of the chastisement he probably wrought upon other wrong doers.

When we take the character of man into consideration we find that all the characteristics of men are represented in each individual, different degrees of development being the only difference, and it is an established fact that the best result is found in the well rounded out character wherein those qualities, of the person, which are apt to lead toward excesses and wrong doing, are held in abeyance by those that are inclined to equity, preservation and the highest attainment of knowledge.

Energy is not the result of want, but want is necessary to the human family in order to spur up and set in motion that attribute called energy

which is inherent in each human being to a greater or less degree.

Set this energy into exertion and if the being upon whom it operates is unbalanced in the organs which constitute government within his being he will run to excess, and this quality of man marks his character.

If acquisitiveness is very highly developed he is likely to become a thief; if the organ of destructiveness is large the individual is in danger of becoming a murderer, and so on through the whole category.

If on the other hand those organs which tend toward elevating the character of a man are well developed his tendency is upward toward a higher, nobler and more intelligent life.

That competition tends toward bettering the condition of mankind is not true, as under its rule there is ample produced and manufactured to feed, clothe, shelter and educate the whole human family, yet the world is full of poverty, wretchedness, ignorance and crime, all of which can be justly charged up as caused by a system which permits a man to contend for and hold as his private property a hundred thousand times more than is necessary to supply all his wants during a long life.

Collectivism reaches the highest goal as has been proved time and time again, even under competition. What nation makes war upon another with a single man? None. But the nation which can raise the largest army and bring the greatest amount of intelligence into the field is sure to have the best of the struggle, intelligent action resulting for those numbers in the contest.

Collective effort has proved so far superior in individual effort that the great monied interests everywhere are combining to get away from competition and to control the laboring and producing classes.

In conclusion we will ask a few questions. If collectivism is good for the capitalist, is it not also good for the producing and laboring classes? If competition is a thing to be avoided by capital, is it not equally as dangerous and undesirable to labor?

Last but not least, can the world grow better through competition—through that which is calculated to stir up all the contention and strife in the human race and pile up selfishness mountains high, while the latter region ferret and devour, year by year, ends up all the characteristics of the lower order, or the animal in man, while the higher attributes of his nature, which are God-like, are smothered and choked out of existence?

A System and Its Results.

It is much the fashion to extol Carnegie as a philanthropist and public benefactor. He has accumulated two hundred millions of dollars, and now is giving them away and making a virtue of it. But The Oregonian has doubts about the ability of anybody to make a virtue of the way in which these two hundred millions were accumulated. It was the system of tariff robbery, in the name of protection, which this country has pursued, that gave Carnegie his opportunity. No man can accumulate so vast a sum as two hundred millions of dollars without frightful injustices to vast numbers of people; and in this case the accumulation represents oppression of labor on the one hand and extortionate prices for commodities on the other.

The chief instrument that enabled Carnegie to accomplish this was protective tariff—that is to say, protected robbery. Carnegie was in position to take advantage and highest advantage of this favoritism of the law, at a time when larger manufacture and larger use of iron and steel were just beginning, and he was enabled by support of this form of robbery through law to extort extreme prices and at the same time force labor to his own terms. Men had to work for what he was pleased to give them, and he could extort for the product of their labor what prices he chose. He was the first to get the business established on a large basis, and therefore was enabled to monopolize it. Under no other conditions could so colossal a fortune have been made. It was not possible in England or elsewhere, and was possible here only through protected robbery. Instead of labor, instead the oppression of the system was answered by such things as the fact of Homestead, and the whole world of the United States. Their title to this fortune of two hundred millions through excessive prices for products of iron and steel. The unskilled, they are paying the tribute still, for the billion dollar steel trust, successor of Carnegie's operations, still revels in the excess of "protected" bounty, and while it maintains high prices at home it sells at lower prices in the competitive markets of the world, after payment of the transportation.

If there is anything equitable in the system, or anything to be lost of an honest and equitable adjustment in the distribution of a fortune of two hundred millions, which it is in making it the holder of the system of robbery, that is to say, a fortune of two hundred millions of the people of the United States. The Oregonian has heard that it is a "good" thing to see it. There is a sort upon these industrial fortunes, obtained in such ways, that all great Neptune's ocean can't wash away. How long is the time to be partitioned in such affairs? We think not much longer. A national opinion is whether it is to be upset without destruction of the Republican party.—Oregonian.
