EDITORIAL.

J. Pierpont Morgan represents a tower of wealth and power, the greatness of which the average mind is incapable of conceiving. By pursuing these ends this republic will become the greatest power upon the earth and you citizens of this great country will be more than ever respected and loved by all."

About the most interesting set of fellows in every community are the geniuses who imagine they are great and talented and destined to shine in the world and who are logrolling and crowding to the front like thirsty oxen at a watering trough, each afraid the world is not going to recognize his greatness. They have a horn in the side for this one, a bunch for that one, and a general desire to trample down all who stand in the way of their success in getting there. Such have no principle of live and let-live in their composition. They never knowingly parade the virtues of another, or speak unreservedly of the good qualities of a fellow creature. All their friends are so many useful pieces of furniture, so many stepping stones for them to climb. Society is a kind of step ladder by which they mount over the garden wall of success and grasp their fill of the fruit growing there and never thinking that another's mouth is watering, and that another has desires and feelings which in their mad scramble they have rudely pushed aside. The true view of life has never broken on these sordid undeveloped natures. They are swallowed up in self seeking, forgetting that he is greatest who most faithfully serves others, and that the Son of Man came not to be ministered to, but to minister unto others. The Apostle Paul laid down the golden rule of conduct, "In Honor Preferring One Another," not each unimpeded for himself. He that exalteth himself shall be abased, and he that thinketh little of himself shall be exalted. Greatness is the very reverse of the village egotist. This gift of grace is referred to in scripture where it is said that to him that hath it shall be given and from him that hath it shall be taken away that which he hath. Of course, each has in him the seed of true greatness and soul equality with the divine, except the village egotist. He is the fellow from whom it has been taken away. But poor devils, they are not to blame when nine tenths of the followers of the great example are inflating themselves by this same process and swelling up their frog nature to the fullest extent of their ox-hide ambitions only to burst when some pin point of truth punctures their inflated rubber.—Capitol Journal.

The Congressional Junketing Party.

The Capitol Journal, of Salem, in speaking of the Congressional party which has been visiting the West and Northwest ostensibly in the interest of the people generally, for the purpose of determining what improvements can be made to further the producing interests of the Great West, presents the following brief comment upon the utility of the commission:

"When we consider the performance of one man Harriman, of Wall street, being practically in control of three great Trans Continental lines, the antics of a little handful of politicians coming out West and inspecting our rivers and harbors, to see what can be done to improve them, and make them more effective competitors of Harriman et al., are enough to make the angels weep. When it is grasped that the shipplaster fleecing statesmen who through the Washington boarding houses, when they are not debating about the country on some junketing tour, are riding on special trains furnished them to go about the country and lay awake nights to see how they can devise ways and means to cut down the dividends of the plutocrats whose temporary lackeys they are, it is enough to make the people of this earth shed the briny tear at being such everlasting dampfools. Of course, the leather-tongued bowlers who fill the congressional records with scoundrels on expansion and tariff for rural consumption must laugh in their sleeves at the gullibility of the sucker voters who drive miles to get a chance to drop a ballot for the continuation of this farce. But our government survives in spite of these processes. Like a gigantic megatherium of the aeolithic ages, the American political mastodon plunges on, his flanks dangle with parasites and leeches living on his life blood, but strong enough to support them all and still hold his place in the jungle of nations. But the wolves of aggregated capital are snapping at his throat, and unless some way is found to cut their fangs or divert their attention to other game, this government will become weakened by their rapacity, and the old Republican elephant go down in the mire. In the mean time some one ought take a stick and beat off the parasites, at least during the vacation of congress.

Increase in Circulating Medium.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The monthly circulation statement issued by the Controller of the Currency shows that at the close of the fiscal year, June 30, 1901, the total circulation of bank notes was \$653,742,186, an increase for the year of \$44,101,743 and an increase for the month of \$7,153,587. The circulation based on United Bonds was \$323,809,684, an increase for the year of \$49,775,134 and an increase for the month of \$1,807,130.

The circulation secured by lawful money amounted to \$29,851,505, a decrease for the year of \$5,673,380 and an increase for the month of \$1,807,130.

The amount of the United States registered bonds on deposit to secure circulation notes was \$326,210,230, and to secure public deposits \$103,810,450.
