While driving one of them on the track, Friday, he over exerted himself and, as a result, was attacked with a muscular affection of the heart. His most intimate friends anticipated no serious consequences, and it was an unexpected and severe shock when the sad news was learned this morning.—Few men are so universally esteemed as was Mr. Hazard. Honorable, upright and straight forward; the possessor of those sterling qualities which bound with ties of friendship and regard those with whom business or social relations brought him in contact. Openhearted and liberal to a marked degree, always ready to render assistance where needed, and with a kind word and hearty clasp of the hand to cheer the downcast and offer sympathy to the distressed. His public spirit, and the desire to forward enterprises that would be of benefit to the section in which he lived, is well known. His legal ability was recognized all over the state, and he was unanimously accorded a lending place among the lawyers of the Northwest.
