Orent, and the efforts of our Superintendent, Mr. Bunch, in mak-ing this one of the pleasantest and most successful of institutes, and we deeply regret that our State Super-intendent, Prof. J. H. Akerman could not be with us. The institute closed at 4.30 P. M.

That we, the members of the Coos County Institute of 1901, do, through these resolu-tions, express our deep sense of the generous hospitality of the citizens of Bandon, of the extreme courtesy of Captain Banger of the tag Triumph and Captain Johnson and crew of the Life Saving Station, and our ap-preciation of the liberal rates given by Hotels and transportation companies.
