Ignorance and the unimpaired often confuse Socialism with Anarchy. Below are a few cases given from Democratic and Republican sources in which the proper distinction is made:

From the K. G. Daily Times. (Dem.) There is no word which is so often misunderstood as "Socialist." It really means one who studies and works for society, for the people, and so far from being a reproach, to call a man a Socialist is to credit him with the purest and deepest of philanthropic feeling.

From the Chicago Tribune. (Rep.) Upon every occasion when anarchists break loose and put in practice their "gospel of force," there is a popular tendency to include Socialists also in the general condemnation. This, however, is a mistake. The Socialist would have the state control everything; the anarchist would abolish the state and have the individual control everything, which would mean chaos.

From Tacoma, Wash., Daily News. (Dem.) There may be a disposition on the part of some people who have not followed the question to confuse in their minds the doctrines of so called Socialism with the destructive policy of anarchists. Of course, no one who has given any thought to the great social and economic questions which are now pressing for a solution would be in danger of any such confusion of mind...

But Socialism and anarchy are wholly distinct and they are diametrically opposite to each other. A man cannot be a true Socialist and advocate anarchy any more than he can be a follower of Jesus Christ and at the same time be a murderer and assassin at heart.

Biblical Prophecy of Shamrock.

A curious illustration of how a Bible text may be found for almost any occasion is furnished in the sermon preached last Sunday by Dr. Reed Mackay to the crew of the yacht Shamrock on a text taken from Isaiah xxxiii 23, which reads: "Their tacklings are loosed; they could not hold strengthen their mast; they could not spread the sail; then is the prey of a great spoil divided; the lame take the prey." Dr. Mackay said this was a prophecy of victory for Shamrock, the last clause being especially applicable to Sir Thomas Lipton, who is still lame from the effect of a recent accident.

Oregonian: Famines prevail in some portions of Russia year after year. This condition now exists in nineteen provinces among the most populous in the empire. This means the utter destitution of hundreds of thousands and the necessity of government relief for them for at least nine months. Systematic efforts for the relief of these people—as industries and economical as any upon earth—are in progress. Notwithstanding this, suffering from hunger and its deadly ally, typhus, or, it is fitly called in Russia, the "hunger fever," will be past computation.

Oregonian: The inventive genius of man is constantly manifesting its power in the world of material thing. A conspicuous example of this manifestation is found in turning to account, through mechanical invention, the product of thousands of acres of wire grass that grows upon the marsh lands of Minnesota. Five years ago this grass, being nutritious, was worthless. Now it is harvested and manufactured into twine and various articles of furniture, and has become one of the most valuable products of the state. One company in St. Paul alone has 6000 men working on wire grass products. This is the largest single industry in the city, and promises further expansion. Our pine-needle industry in Southern Oregon is analogous to this in that it converts into articles of commercial value a heretofore worthless and practically impenetrable product of the land.
