EDITORIAL

It will be impossible to couple the anarchists, who have been associated in the Goebel assassination, and murder trial case, with the Socialists.

The inquiry into the conduct of Rear Admiral Schley proves where that gentleman was during the battle of Santiago, July 3, 1898, and it might be well to look up the locality of Admiral Sampson during the same period so as to determine whom Uncle Sam should honor for that famous 4th of July gift of the year mentioned.

Secretary of the Treasury Lyman J. Gage wants the faults eliminated from the present currency scheme. He wishes to retire government legal tender notes, and desires to do away with the public treasury, and have Uncle Sam do his business through the banks.
