EDITORIAL.

General Buller claims to be the victim of conspiracy and threatens to reveal the secret of the Jameson raid in Africa. The revelation would most likely prove a surprise to the world, and while he is doing the revealing act he might make a decided hit by giving to the world the secret history which led to England's present trouble in the transvaal.

The election of Seth Low to the majority of New York is a victory over Tammany, and probably presages its overthrow, while it is almost certain to end the political career of Croker. The citizens did well and if they will make a thorough house cleaning, turn the rascals out and keep them out they will have set an example which the citizens of Chicago, Philadelphia and other large cities might imitate with beneficial result.

President Roosevelt should feel highly honored by the silly comparisons that are coming his way now. First he is found to possess the characteristics of the German emperor, and is likened to the Kaiser. Then an ingenious admirer discovered that there is a similarity existing between him and Rudyard Kipling, and he is compared with that poet. He should feel highly complimented at this, for soon some fool will discover that he walks on two legs and ascribe to him a semblance to the ape. However the average patriotic citizens of this country prefer to think of him as a thorough American citizen and not as a foreign dupe.

The Coquille Herald of last week gave out following item of news: J. M. Bright, who is preparing a small steamer to ply on the North Fork during high water received a boiler and engine from the bay last Saturday and removed them from the car to the boat landing Sunday. Arthur Ellingson will build the hull at once, which will be 35 feet in length and 8 feet beam. This will certainly be a great convenience to the farmers of this branch of the river, as most of the good weather in the fall is used in harvesting crops, and the roads get bad before they can be gotten to market. This will give the people a chance to get all their produce out and their goods in return at all times of the year.
