Thanksgiving Proclamation. SALEM, Nov. 14.—Governor Geer yesterday issued his Thanksgiving proclamation. It is as follows: "Although not yet passed from beneath the shadow of the great National tragedy which took from us the presence and counsel of one of our most beloved Chief Magistrates, we find reason for National thanksgiving in the unifying effect the great affliction has had upon the different sections of our common country, and for the prospect of a continued era of good feeling. At no time within 50 years has party feeling been less bitter, or country so harmonious in matters concerning its domestic welfare."

Important News Notes. TUESDAY Nov. 12 Two battalions of the 28th Infantry left Portland for San Francisco to-day by railway, bound for the Philippines. Heavy storms over England and Ireland did much damage to shipping and other property. China is manufacturing arms and munitions on a large scale. The mail boat Nord ran into the lightsight off Dover pier, on the English coast, with the result that the lightsight sank and its sixteen occupants were drowned. Carnegie has offered \$2,000,000 for a polytechnical school at Pittsburgh providing that city will donate a site. Three more of the escaped convicts from Fort Leavenworth prison have been captured. WEDNESDAY Nov. 13 Insurgents were routed from their camp in Batangas Province. Hariman and Hill, railroad interests reach an agreement on Northern Pacific. The Secretary of the Interior has created a Bureau of Forestry. President Roosevelt pledges the Lewis and Clark Centennial his hearty support. Bulgarian officials disclaim any intention to interfere in the case of Miss Stone. General Reyes has been recalled from France to Columbia and may become its President.

Hot Time in Ireland. LONDON, Nov. 15.—The Evening News to-day says the Irish Nationalists have offered Mr. Kruger a safe Parliamentary seat in Ireland. They hold that in consequence of Lord Kitchener's proclamation, Mr. Kruger is de facto a British subject. NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—A telegram to the London Times and New York Times giving additional details regarding the election campaign troubles in Ireland, says William H. K. Redmond, M. P., is conducting a vigorous canvass of the Galway City electors on behalf of Colonel Arthur Lynch. Mr. Redmond urges the electors to "haul down the blood-stained, whisky-stained flag of England, and hoist the banner of the green nationality." DUBLIN, Nov. 16.—Rioting between the Horace Plunkett and Arthur Lynch factions as a result of the Parliamentary contest in Galway, was renewed last night. The Lynchites stormed the Unionist headquarters, and further demolished the doors and windows. Numbers of persons were injured and several heads were split. Colonel Lynch has not yet appeared on the scene, and is not expected. The Nationalists assert that if the Colonel is elected he will be "smuggled" inside the House of Commons to take the oath and then "face the music," if accused of treason for fighting in behalf of the Boers. John Dillon is actively campaigning against Mr. Plunkett, his object, it is alleged, being to cause Mr. Plunkett's retirement from the vice-presidency of the Irish agricultural and industrial department, which will probably follow his defeat. Mr. Dillon's attitude is in line with his denunciation of John Redmond because the latter so warmly supported Mr. Plunkett's projects for the regeneration of agriculture in Ireland on the parliamentary committee whose labors resulted in the formation of the new department. Four hundred extra policemen were drafted to Galway to-day, and were patrolling the streets. A large force of police is held at the Court-house in readiness for eventualities.
