Minnesota Governor Determined to Prevent Consolidation of Big Railway Lines.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 19.—The Dispatch says: Governor Van Sant has sent a special messenger to find Attorney-General Douglass in the Northern Minnesota woods and request him to return to the city, so that a consultation may be held with regard to the railway situation.

The first step will be to learn from the Attorney General what legal steps are necessary to bring the matter to a final issue as speedily as possible.

The Governor has received no telegrams or advices from Governors of neighboring states as to what action they will take, but it is expected that the fight will be taken up in all of the Northwestern States, several of which have laws similar to Minnesota regarding paralleling railroads.

Algiers Drydock Completes a Long Sea Voyage.

The greatest steel drydock in the world has arrived at Algiers, La., after a long voyage at sea. The tow of the monster began Wednesday, Oct. 16, when the tugs Samson and Taurus pulled it out of Sparrows Point, Baltimore.

The dock is 525 by 126 feet. A walk around the structure is equal to one mile. Six thousand tons of steel and 1000 tons of machine constitute the equipment in the main of this dock.

All floating drydocks look pretty much alike, and the great Algiers dock is a fair likeness of the structure to be built in Portland.

In Great Britain 229 out of 749 municipalities are experimenting in municipal ownership.

The Minister of Railways of New Zealand announces that the state ownership of railroads is now yielding a profit to the colony, notwithstanding the fact that there has been a reduction of rates.

Although the price of coal in the United States is lower than in English cities, the municipal gas plants in England furnish their product to the consumer at much lower prices per thousand cubic feet than are charged here.

The latest report of the Commissioners of Labor on the Chicago sweatshops gives average earnings of \$76 a year.

One woman, for instance, worked ten hours at sewing on buttons for forty cents a week. That is two-thirds of a cent per hour.

Plot to Overthrow Canada in The Yukon.

Toronto, Ontario, Nov. 20.—Special dispatches from Vancouver published here says:

"The Yukon insurrection story is not altogether without foundation. Some hair-brained Americans drew up plans for forcibly overthrowing the police and government in the Yukon, somewhat similar to the historical Jameson raid in the Transvaal."

"The Yukon police force consists of about 250 men who are provided with Lee-Enfields. When the scheme was first discovered Maxim and Colt guns were mounted at White Horse, which was the first place to be attacked."

"The information has been obtained from ex-police officials of the Yukon force and members of the gambling fraternity, who have come to the Coast cities for the winter, and is guardedly confirmed by the officials who have just come down from the north."
