EDITORIAL

The Philippine ports are held to be subject to United States coastwise laws, and yet the constitution does not follow the flag.

Selfishness is very conspicuous in an individual whose desire is to possess everything in sight to the exclusion of the interests and rights of all other people.

And now comes the news that the projectors of the Ship Subsidy Scheme have abandoned their pet for the present, the opposition having become so strong that it is hopeless to further push the project. This is good news so far as it reaches, but it need be no surprise to the public if the slimy coils of the serpent is seen reaching out again in a more subtle manner once the public mind is lulled to rest. Possibly the change in administration may have something to do with the repose of this scheme to fleece the common public.

The Oregonian of the 4th inst., gave a fine account of the floating of the bark Baroda, but unfortunately the scow which was reported to have been used as a fulcrum was at that time piled up high and dry on the beach and the bark still rests in her sandy bed having only been turned head on to the sea.

Oregonian: Mr. Courtney, a distinguished English political economist, in a recent public address expressed gloomy views concerning England's future commercial prosperity. England's industrial leadership was due to the fact that she had cheap coal and iron in abundance when the age of steam came on, and also plenty of capital and a skilled population to turn her natural resources into commodities so cheaply that she was able to undersell the world. But to-day the supremacy in coal and iron is departed from England. The United States and Germany both lead Great Britain in population, and Mr. Courtney, with respect to capital, concludes that Britain's supremacy over America is going, if it has not already gone. Mr. Courtney sees no remedy for Britain's decline to a subordinate commercial position in the future compared with the United States and Germany.

Six carloads of myrtle blocks passed through town on Wednesday's train, for Coos bay, for S. R. Davis, to be shipped to San Francisco. These timbers were gotten out and saved on the South Fork, and will be used in the construction of the government dock at Mare Island navy yard.

The steamer Comet has been sold to parties in San Francisco and will be taken to that port at the first favorable opportunity.

Co., when asked concerning the reports from New York relative to the serious illness of Elijah Smith, said that it was a wonderfully exaggerated story. Mr. Smith has been suffering for six months past with nervousness, and has been in a sanitarium for a long period. He is now much improved and out of danger. Remarkable Experience of the Long-passage Chamberlain Coaster.

It is reported that the schooner Wing and Wing will take a cargo of lumber from Knappton for San Francisco. This is in line with the previous experience of the vessel, which from early life has been very much like Mark Twain's "Allen Pepper-box" shooting iron, which never hit where it was intended to, but always got something else. The Wing and Wing started her career under false colors, for her name was a misnomer. She should have been called the Crawl and Creep, for nearly all of her life she has been traveling sidewise like a crab, or creeping ahead at a snail's pace. In build she was a cross between a Sacramento River bay scow and a Noah Bay Indian schooner. These peculiarities of construction have resulted in the vessel becoming a "proy to the winds" whenever there was any blowing, and she has seldom if ever made a trip without ending it under a distress signal. She sailed from San Francisco for Coos Bay a few years ago, and after a passage of nearly two months, ran into San Diego short of provisions.

Her Oregon destination was eventually reached, and in the course of time she worked back to San Francisco, where her owner sent her to the retirement of Oakland Creek. Business improving again, she was hauled out of the mud and headed for Gray's Harbor. The wind had shifted since her previous voyage, and after beating and drifting between Honolulu and San Francisco for two months, she at last succeeded in getting as far North as Coos Bay, where she put in for food and water. Wish ing to have the Gray's Harbor cargo before the end of the century, Mr. Simpson had sent one of his other vessels for it, so the Wing and Wing loaded at Coos Bay and drifted back to San Francisco, where she was again sent into retirement. On the next trial of the Wing and Wing Mr. Simpson decided to send out an expert navigator, and selected Dan Kilman for the task of navigating the erratic scow to Coos Bay. Dan had sailed over the course with a barkentine in 48 hours, but his two months' store of provisions were all exhausted when he finally "arrived out" at the Oregon port. As a "drifter" the Wing and Wing beats a fake bottle message.

Montezuma's Well.

One of the most pleasing natural curiosities in the territory of Arizona, is the pool of water known as Montezuma's well. It is situated 15 miles northeast of the old military post known as Camp Verde. It is 250 feet diameter, and the clear pure water is about 60 feet below the surface of the surrounding country. Some years ago certain military officers sounded the pool and found that it had a uniform depth of 90 feet of water except in one place, apparently about six feet square, where the sounding line went down about 500 feet without touching bottom.

The well empties into Beaver creek only about 100 yards distant, the water gushing forth from the rocks as though it were under great pressure. The well is undoubtedly supplied from subterranean sources, possibly through the hole sounded by the army officers years ago. The sides of the well are honeycombed with caves and tunnels, permitting sight-seers to descend to the water's edge.

Montezuma's well contains no fish. The flow of water from it is the same throughout the season. Popular opinion has attributed the origin of the well to volcanic action, but as the rock surrounding it is limestone it is more than probable that the action of the water is responsible for its creation.—Native American.
