Will Fight Yankees if Necessary

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 19.—There was an exciting debate in the House of Commons today on the Alaskan boundary question. It was brought up by Henry Bourassa, who moved for all papers and correspondence connected with the Clayton-Bulwer treaty and Alaskan boundary. The Premier said the correspondence could not be presented while negotiations were going on. Mr. Bourassa did not see how that excuse could apply to the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. He pointed out that Canadian interests were always sacrificed by Great Britain to the United States. Britain, like Providence, wanted to be on the side of the big battalions. He pointed to the Alabama claims, the Trent affair, the Alaskan boundary, the placing of an embargo on Canadian cattle, the aiding of immigration to South Africa and other cases to show that Britain was always ready to sacrifice Canadian interests.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Premier, said he was not an admirer of the British policy on the American continent, but he did not think even Mr. Bourassa would ask that Britain should go to war with the United States. What was necessary was a time to see if an amicable solution could be arrived at.

S. F. Courlain, of Picton, Nova Scotia, struck a fighting attitude and declared he agreed with Mr. Bourassa, although he had never done so before. He accused Britain of always sacrificing Canada in its negotiations with the United States, and said rather than to submit he and his family would go into the trenches and stay there for two years, if need be, to fight for the rights of Canada. "If it is necessary," he said "to fight the Yankees we will fight within 24 hours and after six months we will capture their capital and annex their country to Canada." Mr. Bourassa then withdrew his motion.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 20.—Los Banos, the bath-house near the Santa Fe Station, was this afternoon the scene of a daylight robbery unprecedented for boldness. Mrs. Nevins, the wife of the proprietor, lies in a serious condition as the result of a knife stab, and the robber is in jail with a pistol ball in one of his legs. The robber was discovered by Mr. Nevins holding a knife at the throat of a stranger and taking his valises. Mr. Nevins grappled with him but the robber turned the knife on the proprietor and took from him his watch and money. At this juncture Mrs. Nevins discovered what was going on and hurried to her husband with a revolver. The robber plunged his knife into her left side and rushed out of the house, followed by Mr. Nevins, who fired and brought down the man. Officers arrived on the scene in time to prevent the escape of the robber.

Boil in soft water until the strength is extracted. Strain carefully and add one pint of best sirup and one pound of loaf sugar. Simmer together. Bottle up tight when cold and take a tablespoonful three or four times a day.—Ez.
