EDITORIAL.

And now it is Major Jenkins' turn to have a say. He will not accept the sword the presentation of which was accepted by President Roosevelt and canceled by Lieutenant Governor James Tillman, of South Carolina.

Now that Miss Ellen M. Stone has been liberated Uncle Sam intends that Turkey shall have to stand reimbursement of the sum paid to the brigands. The sum paid was \$72,000 and the old Turk will do a whole lot of sweating before that sum is squeezed through his fingers.

South Carolinians evidently believe one turn deserves another of like character. President Roosevelt canceled Senator Tillman's invitation to dine with Prince Henry, and now an invitation which had been extended President Roosevelt to present a sword to Major Michah Jenkins of the First United States Volunteers, has been canceled by request of the people who contributed to the purchase of the sword.

The Oregonian, in speaking of the Tillman-McLaurin affair says: "The Senate can partially redeem itself by taking a stand now against ruffians, liars and blackguards." Well! when we come to consider that "stand," and take into consideration the charges that have been made against members of that body as to the means used in securing their election, the investigating committees, etc., the redeeming features may be considered a doubtful quantity.

In the "go" between Senators Tillman and McLaurin, the U. S. Senate has lost its greatest opportunity, and the twin deserve censure for losing their heads. The idea that pugilists should get hasty, go on the stage without donning the gloves, without a time-keeper, without a referee, without having the meeting properly advertised, especially when places of note stand ready to offer large money to witness pugnaeous scenes, is enough to chagrine the Senate.

Elsewhere is published an article, this week, showing some of the expenses which Cabinet members and Senators are subject to at Washington. There is one point that can be discerned very clearly by a perusal of these expenses and that is, that these servants of the people are tied down to custom and show as tightly as a dude is to fashionable dress. High living, pomp, glitter and fashion seems to be the order of progress, and it is little wonder that governments retrograde in their general purpose, which is to give the people a safe, honest and equitable administration.

That a man is known largely by the company he keeps, is an old truism, while another proverb says that "The books a man reads are an index to his character." Both these sayings are true and there are other fingerboards along life's pathway that point out the different stages with unflinching accuracy. Denver will give \$10,000 for the Corbett-McGovern fight, and Los Angeles will pay \$20,000 for the Jeffries-Fitzsimmons fight. These are handsome sums for cities to pay for something that has not the least element of morality or humanity in it; something that carries nothing but brutality and impurity within its scope. Did you say the world is growing better?

Philadelphia Record: We draw in long breaths and protrude when we talk of our billion-dollar export business. It is magnificent. But we forget that we are a billion-dollar country and there are many millions of us. Our exports amount to \$19 per head and this is much, but the exports of Great Britain are \$30 per head and the exports of France \$21 per head. Even Germany follows close at our heels with yearly exports of \$16 per head.

Toledo Bee: If protection is such a wonderfully good thing, why don't the Republican leaders in Congress jump at the chance to discuss it and spread their argument before the people? Carnegie accumulated several hundred millions while the people were being taxed to protect him. The steel trust is selling steel rails in Europe for \$17 and charging Americans \$28 for the same rails. They can do that because their infant industry is protected.

Cabinet Positions Expensive.

A member of the Cabinet, to entertain largely, should have such a house as usually rents at from \$6,000 to \$12,000 a year. Senator Depew pays \$10,000 a month for his house. On the other side, Secretary Wilson, who is a comparatively poor man, lives in a house that rents for not more than \$75 a month. Postmaster-General Smith spent his entire salary of \$8,000 a year, and was compelled to write magazine articles and to add to his income in other ways to maintain his establishment. He finally wearied of the struggle and took apartments at a hotel.

Each Cabinet Minister is expected once a year to entertain the President and his associates at dinner. Beyond this he can cut out dinner-giving. The Secretary of State, in addition, must give a breakfast once a year to the diplomatic corps. Secretary Day resigned because he could not afford to follow the social pace.

Carrriages and horses are furnished by the Government to Cabinet members. All other expenses they must pay themselves. A member of the Cabinet maintaining his own house would have to expend at least \$15,000 a year, or nearly double his salary, to keep up even ordinary appearances.

Attorney-General Knox, upon taking up his residence in Washington, began by purchasing a house costing \$140,000 and bringing with him a team of horses that cost \$12,000. His expenses will be vastly in excess of \$15,000 a year.

James S. Clarkson, when he became First Assistant Postmaster General, rented a house at \$3800 a year. His salary was \$4900. Mr. Clarkson laughingly said to his wife: "What shall we do with the remainder of my salary?"

"Rent a telephone," was the reply.

Boers Caught in Trap.
