EDITORIAL.

The Chinese throne has issued an edict discouraging the ancient custom of binding the feet of females. This would indicate at least one step toward a higher humanity through regard for natural laws.

Advocates of the competitive system are beginning to use their old lash to rot the growth of Socialism and to keep their weak kneed followers in line. This lash is ridicule. It is the argument of fools who are unable to meet issues and overthrow them by reason, and can effect but the weak and foolish. The intelligent, honest person, who knows that a thing is right, does that thing because it is right regardless of ridicule.

The term "between the devil and the deep sea" is sometimes quoted as representative of an existing condition, or one proposed, and the term might be applied to those who are fighting Socialism, as taught and urged upon the basis of right and equitable conditions, yet who are aiding and abetting Trust Socialism by upholding conditions which make it possible for large concentrations of capital to overcome competition and flourish at the expense of the general public which constitute, by far, the greater part of humanity. This class stands between the two forces, and aids in its own enslavement, while its true friends battle for perfect liberty.

The partisan Democrat or Republican tells the Socialist that he will throw his vote away as the Socialist party has not the chance of a chance to win with a single candidate. Well! that is profound reasoning. When did a man ever attain that which he wanted by working for that which he did not want? Now comes the question: Can a man throw his vote away in voting his principles? The answer is no. He has been true to himself, true to what he has advocated, and stands blameless before any judge, while on the other hand, if he has voted for something he does not want, he cannot respect himself, nor does he deserve the respect and confidence of his fellow man. Voting for gratitude, when your judgment says no, is out raging your conscience and weakening your ability to withstand wrong. Did Wendell Phillips throw away his influence when he talked to almost deaf ears about the enormity of chattel slavery thirty-odd years prior to Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation?

The Socialist frequently has the charge flung against him that he "wants to divide up," that is, that he wants a division of the wealth of the world made and each person given his or her share. Bless you, what an idea! How about competition? Does it ever ask a division? Well, hardly! It simply arranges conditions so you have to stand and deliver. What division does the steel trust require when you use any of its manufactures? How much each do you owe to the oil trust, the sugar trust, the tobacco trust, the whiskey trust, or the railroad trust, if you have cause to use the products of each or either, or the advantages they offer you? And when you sit down to enjoy your frugal repast just remember that the salt that savors your vitals costs you four times as much as it did before the salt trust asked—no, demanded you to divide your pittance with its members. Socialism only purports to divide the labor of production with the wealthy classes and is willing that such classes shall have a full and equitable share of that produced. This is fair and it is only a selfish person who is blinded by greed, or one lacking in self respect and the proper spirit of independence who is willing to bask in idleness at the expense of other people's labor.

From the Coast Mail we learn that a shooting scrape occurred Monday afternoon at Libby in which Charles Johnson took a shot at Andrew (Hace Horse) Johnson, the ball grazing the left shoulder. Both men are colored and the row seems to have been the result of an old grudge. Johnson went to Marshallfield and swore out a complaint, charging Johnson with assault with a dangerous weapon. Marshall Carter arrested the accused man and took him to Marshallfield for trial. He was arraigned before Justice Hyde and given till yesterday to plead. Result not yet known.

Initiative and Referendum.

Is self government right? If so, the referendum and initiative follows. Direct legislation means simply an actual instead of a mere theoretic sovereignty of the people. We are governed today, not by a democracy, but by an elective aristocracy holding for a term. The people are sovereign only at the moment of election—the men they elect become their masters for one, two, four, or six years, as the case may be. Self government is one thing—the choosing of the men who are to govern you is a different thing. A child may choose its guardian; a slave might be given a voice in the selection of his master and yet be absolutely subject to his dominion after the choice were made.

Power will be used in the interests of its possessor. If the power of government is to be used in the interests of the people they must have continuous and effective possession of the government. We call our legislators "agents" and the people their "principal"—queer agents who can give away their principal's property despite his protest, and are not responsible to him during their term of service; queer principals that cannot veto his "agents" plans, no matter how much he objects to them, nor instruct his agents what to do whenever he sees fit, nor discharge said agents when they refuse to carry out his orders; queer principals who has to obey the commands of his "agents" instead of giving them orders.—Ex.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., April 3.—Neah Bay Indians, returning from the coast south of Cape Flattery, report that the beach is strewn in places with a large amount of wreckage, consisting of pieces of boats, oars, spars and rigging from vessels. They say that they never saw such a large amount of wreckage. At Quillayute, in a pile of wreckage, a life buoy was found with the name "Mattawan" on it. The buoy was brought to Neah Bay and turned over to the Indian agent, who sent it to Tacoma on the steamer Alcoa Gertrude today.

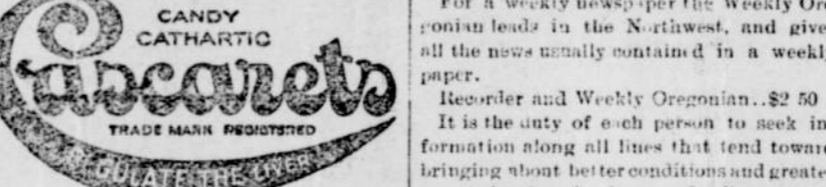
