EDITOR RECORDER: A meeting of those interested in the subject of baseball, was held in this place March 31st at the Tupper Hotel. The meeting was called to order by Charles Lorenz, and on motion, Thos. White was elected chairman. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss and discuss the subject of organizing a ball team for the purpose of joining the Coos Co. Baseball League for the season of 1902. It was decided to take the necessary steps toward the venture, and consequently the business was begun. The first thing in order was the election of a manager, a secretary, treasurer and three directors. Chas. Lorenz was elected manager, Chas. Fredericks secretary, C. Y. Lowe treasurer, and R. E. L. Bedilion, Thos. White and Chas. Lorenz were elected directors. After the organization was completed, steps were taken to secure a good battery and complete all other requirements necessary, including the finance committee who will call on everybody and slight none. It will be the aim of the team to put up a good clean game of ball; it is hoped by the management that all will subscribe as liberally as possible, as it will be the means of bringing a great many people to our little city by the sea. We also intend to do our best to prevent any one man causing a wrangle which can delay a game for a single minute after everything is all ready, as was done several times last season, thereby causing delay as well as disappointment to many of the patrons who love America's National game.

Bandon has the most beautiful ball ground in Coos Co., and will endeavor to place a team on the diamond that will in no way disgrace the past record of the place as a ball town. There is much natural talent in Bandon for this pleasant pastime and why not develop some of it now as well as later.

As far as known at the present time, the league will be composed of four teams: Marshfield, Coquille City, Myrtle Point and Bandon. Get in and put your shoulder to the wheel and help to push the thing along, and then you will see the boys get in and practice. We do not expect to be the last on the list, but will strive to be at the other end, and may the Lord be with us.
