Arrangements have been made for a game of ball at Bandon on Sunday, May 11, between the Bandon and Myrtle Point teams. We understand that the gate receipts are to be divided and used for the purchase of uniforms for the two teams.

The Roseburg land office has been instructed to accept all timber filings and final profits made before County Clerks and United States Commissioners. The Del Norte Record reported the bark Baroda in commission again. The Record was a little premature. The Baroda is still anchored on the Bandon beach, and the length of time that she will remain there has not been determined. She will probably prove an attraction to the Summer visitors to the beach this year at least.

The Coos Mail is authority for the statement that George Beale, the Republican nominee for assessor, declines to run for that office, and gives as a reason that Mr. Beale has purchased a farm that will require all his attention. The county central committee has been called to meet at Coquille City tomorrow to fill his place on the ticket.

Disabled ships have disbursed \$150,000 in Portland for repair work since last July.

The irrigation companies will have a lien on the land for the cost of the improvement and 6 per cent interest. By paying this amount, any settler can secure not to exceed 100 acres of any tract reclaimed.
